ORDINANCE NO. 48.

An Ordinance to Abolish Opium-smoking Dens. The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1. No person or persons shall, within the limit of Carson City, keep or maintain, or become an inmate of, or visit or contribute to, the support of any place, house or room, where persons frequent, or assemble, for the purpose of smoking opium, and all such places, houses or rooms, are hereby declared to be nuisances.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment, not more than thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.
