

NEVADA LEGISLATURE—NINTH SESSION.

Senate—Fifty-fifth Day.

CARSON CITY, March 1, 1879.

The Senate convened at 10:30 o'clock with the President in the Chair. Quorum present. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Davis. Minutes of previous day read and approved.

Leave of absence granted Senator Blair.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Temporary leave of absence granted to the Committee on Railroads.

By Gibson, from Committee on State's Prison—Favorably Senate bill 150.

By Stewart, from Committee on Education—Without recommendation Senate bill 157, amending Public School law.

By Moder, from Committee on Enrollment—That several bills have been found correctly enrolled and deposited with the Governor.

By Martin, from Committee on Engrossment—Have found several bills so ordered correctly engrossed.

By Boardman, from Judiciary Committee—Unfavorably on Senate bill 158, for support of the Orphan Asylum at Virginia City.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Stone—To reconsider the vote on Senate bill 146, to regulate fees and compensations of Sheriffs for 1876. Lost.

By Comins—To reconsider the vote on Senate bill 123. [The Nye County bill.] Carried.

By Comins—That standing committees report all Senate bills by Monday and Assembly bills by Tuesday next. Adopted.

By Schultz—That the State Treasurer pay Michael Cavanaugh \$120 for services as porter. Adopted.

MESSAGERS FROM THE ASSEMBLY.

Transmitting several bills upon which action has been taken in that body and reported.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Schultz (without notice)—To amend the Act to incorporate the city of Virginia. Referred to Storey County Delegation.

By Stone—To regulate the price of gas in cities in the State. Referred to Committee on State Affairs.

By Gibson—To amend the charter of the town of Gold Hill. Referred to Storey County Delegation.

By Cassidy (without notice)—To fix the salary of the District Attorney of Eureka County. [Raises it to \$1,800 per annum.] Under suspension of the rules put upon final passage and passed.

Mayhugh's Assembly joint resolution, relative to changing the U. S. Constitution concerning the election of United States Senators. Referred to Committee on Federal Relations.

Assembly bill 102, to amend the Act concerning the office of Surveyor General. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Assembly bill 103, to appropriate money for the payment of claims against the State. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

Assembly bill 119, to provide for calling extra terms of court in certain cases. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Assembly bill 119, to admit to probate the will of A. Benedict. Under suspension of the rules passed by vote of ayes 18, noes 5.

Assembly bill 142, to prohibit the employment of Chinese on public works. Referred to Committee on Public morals. Recessed for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reconvened at 2:30 P. M., the President in the Chair.

On motion of Powning the Senate resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for consideration of the following bills:

Senate bill 57, to authorize the payment of \$2,500 to Capt. Matthewson for meritorious services. Amended to make the sum \$500 and recommended passage.

Assembly bill 61, favorably, to provide the Land Office with a seal.

Also favorably Assembly bill 28, for relief of Jerry Schooling.

Also unfavorably to create a State Board of Health.

Also unfavorably Senate bill 15, providing for the incorporation and management of railroads.

Also Senate bill 138, to provide for purchase of portrait of ex-Governor Nye, favorably.

Also Senate bill 142, relative to adorning ground of the proposed site of an Insane Asylum at Reno, favorably.

Also Assembly bill 106, for relief of B. F. Wallace, ex-Deputy Assessor of Storey County. Amended to reduce from \$132 to \$50, and reported favorably.

Also Assembly bill 57, to establish a State Printing Office and create the office of Superintendent of State Printing. Recommended passage.

Also Senate bill 152, to provide for purchase of portraits of ex-Governors Blaisdel and Bradley, favorably.

Also, Assembly bill 103, to pay certain claims against the State for Indian war services, favorably.

Also Senate bill 134, to add the statutes of 1875, '77 and '79 to the compiled laws. Recommended to refer to Judiciary Committee.

Also Senate bill 153, to aid the Nevada State Agricultural Society at Carson, \$5,000. Amended to donate a like amount to the society at Reno and reported without recommendation.

Also Senate bill 152, for relief of James E. Wood for horse stolen by escaped prisoners. \$150 allowed and bill recommended passage.

Also Senate bill 75, to provide an asylum for the indigent of the State. Amended making appropriation \$30,000. Amended by giving counties a chance to bid for the location of the building. Passage recommended as amended.

Committee then rose and reported as instructed.

Mr. Cassidy by leave introduced a bill to provide for the government of unincorporated towns. Ordered printed.

Mr. Farrell by leave reported from the Railroad Committee, unfavorably on the Lewis railroad bill, giving as a reason for such report the legal opinions of Attorney General Murphy, General Clarke and Mr. Ellis, of its unconstitutionality.

Doolin's Senate bill 98—To amend the Act regulating fees of sheriffs, being the special order, was taken up for reconsideration. Lost. Ayes 11, noes 12.

Cassidy gave notice of motion to reconsider. Boardman's Senate bill 115—To regulate freights and fares on railroads. Indefinitely postponed.

Powning's Senate bill 142, concerning the insane of the State.—Locates the site for an asylum at Reno, and appropriates \$5,000 for beautifying the grounds, and getting plans and specifications of buildings.

Creswell moved to amend by making the amount of \$2,500 instead of \$5,000. Lost. Bill passed. Ayes 16, noes 7.

Mr. Doolin moved, out of order, to take up Assembly message. Carried. The message being the return of the bill transferring moneys from Building Fund to General Fund, on the ground that it had not been considered in Committee of the Whole.

On motion of Mr. Cassidy, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Honorable body that as no appropriation was made the bill did not properly go to that committee.

Mr. Wheeler by leave introduced a bill out of order—To pay deficiency for State Prison supplies in 1870. Referred to Committee on Claims.

Adjourned at 4:45 P. M.

Convened at 10:30 A. M. Speaker Gaston in the chair. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Weir.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

By Allen of Lincoln, from Judiciary Committee, favorably Senate bill 58, for purchase of Hawley's Digest and Sawyer's Reports; also Senate bill 38, to amend the Civil Practice Act by exempting \$2,500 of printing office property.

By Vansickle, from Committee on Contingent Expenses, favorably on relief bill of Duncan and Greenlaw.

By Fraser, from Committee on Elections, favorably Senate bill 52, to amend the registration law; also Senate bill 94, to amend the election law.

By Morrison, from State Prison Committee, favorably on Senate substitute bill authorizing the use of convict labor.

By Wilson, from White Pine Delegation, favorably Senate bill 131, to amend Current Expense Fund of that county.

By Lyons, from Storey Delegation, favorably with amendments Assembly bill 101, regulating the price of water.

By Mayhugh, from Elko Delegation, favorably Senate bill 63, relative to issuance of bonds for construction of county jail.

Mayhugh, from Select Committee, reported a substitute for the rejected Chinese bill. Under suspension of rules put upon passage and passed—yeas, 44; noes, 1.

By Lyons, as correctly enrolled several bills and resolutions and properly deposited.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

Announcing his approval of Assembly bill 2, amending the lien law; also Assembly bill 4, supplemental to the land law, providing for sale of donated lands; also Assembly bill 19, to amend the Railroad Incorporation Act; also Assembly bill 55, providing for better security of life by use of safety cages in mines where cages are in use.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Shakespeare—To make Assembly bill relative to freights and fares the special order for 2 P. M.

Allen of Lincoln moved to lay on the table. Carried—yeas, 23; noes, 21.

Assembly bill 14—Amending the Orphan Home Act by admitting children of divorced parents.

Hanna moved to go into Committee of the Whole. Lost.

By Robinson—To meet at 10 P. M. Adopted.

By Mayhugh—To allow ex-Controller Hobart \$548 for copying his reports for 1877 and 1878. Referred to Committee on Claims.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

Senate bill 157—To authorize the payment of M. Bennet by Eureka County. Referred to Eureka Delegation.

Senate bill 2—To reduce rate of taxation. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Senate bill 124—Regulating civil appropriations. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

Assembly bill 87—For relief of Wm. Cook by Virginia City. Taken from the table and indefinitely postponed. Recessed for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convened at 1:15 P. M. Leave of absence granted Lyons of White Pine.

Allen of Lincoln moved to recommit to the Virginia portion of the Storey Delegation the Wm. Cook relief bill. Carried.

GENERAL FILE.

Senate bill 114—To amend the Criminal Practice Act. Passed.

Senate bill to encourage the growth of forest and shade trees. Passed—yeas, 24; noes, 18.

Senate bill 88—To transfer the balance in the State Building Fund to the General Fund. Passed.

Senate bill 103—To amend the wild game law. Passed.

Boardman's Senate bill 113—To amend the partition fence law. Lost—yeas, 5; noes, 38.

Mayhugh gave notice of a motion to reconsider.

Stewart's Senate bill 122—To encourage the collection of geological, paleontological and mineral specimens in this State. Passed.

Cassidy's Senate bill 119—To provide for the better preservation of mining records. Passed.

Lyons of Storey gave notice of a motion to reconsider.

Fraser's Assembly bill 85—To authorize the Nevada Building Association to give entertainments for purpose of erecting public buildings by a tax of 10 per cent. upon the receipts. Passed.

Senate bill 115—Amending the County Commissioner Act. Passed.

Assembly bill 121—To amend the Civil Practice Act. Lost.

Recess till 7 o'clock P. M.

Assembly met at 7:30 P. M. There being no quorum present the House adjourned.


