JAIL DELIVERY.

JOHNNY DAVIS AND A CHINAMAN SKIP THE ESTABLISHMENT.

Night before last the notorious Johnny Davis, charged with an assault with intent to kill, and Ah Ching, the Chinese burglar, broke jail. Davis is still at large, but the Chinaman was recaptured at 2 o'clock yesterday morning at the new race track, where he was wandering aimlessly about.

DISTRICT COURT.

State vs. Isaac McConnell; pleaded not guilty on indictment No. 2. Trial set for the 25th instant.

John Kelly vs. M. C. Gardner et al.; demurrer argued and submitted. Motion that one of the attorneys for the defense be allowed twenty days to file brief, taken under advisement.

State vs. Thomas Flynn; sentenced to the State Prison for the term of his natural life. E. Edgecomb vs. S. H. Wright et al.; by consent of counsel passed for the present.

B. F. Small vs. D. G. Corbett; defendant moved for a new trial, granted and set for the 26th instant.

Higgs & Travis vs. T. C. Hanson; findings and decree filed.

S. E. Jones vs. Henry Lebo; demurrer to the answer of the defendant overruled.

Moore, Reynolds & Co. vs. M. M. Gaige; motion to set aside defendant's motion sustained. Counsel for plaintiff filed notice to reinstate attachment.

The first case to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock, will be the trial of Isaac McConnell on indictment No. 1.

SENTENCE OF FLYNN.—As will be seen in our report of yesterday's proceedings of the District Court, Thomas T. Flynn, who was convicted for murder in the second degree, was sentenced, by Judge King, to confinement in the State Prison for the term of his natural life. He will now very likely be released from the dungeon, where he has been confined since he killed Bethards, in July last, and set to work. If there ever was a murderer who ought to have paid the penalty of his crime on the gallows, it is that man Flynn. Before the commission of the crime for which he was sentenced yesterday, he had 17 years more to serve in the State Prison for various other crimes. He is now about 45 years of age; add 17 years to 45; that would make him 62 years of age at the expiration of his prior sentences—probably longer than he will live. Consequently the conclusion we naturally come to is that Flynn was not punished at all for his last and most heinous offense.

HIGH OLD HUNTERS.—Night before last Hon. William Woodburn, Gus Ash, Miles Finlan and a fourth nimrod, all of Virginia, having heard that there were lots of ducks in the vicinity of Franktown, visited that place. They were out all that night, wading in water up to their waists, and at 10 o'clock yesterday morning gave up the hunt in disgust. The last seen of that unsuccessful party of shotguns were they were negotiating for the purchase of a half dozen lean ducks from an antediluvian Indian.

STOCKS.—This commodity was very weak in the Board yesterday. The stock prophet says that it is a bear move from the inside to make small margin holders unload, and that a booming market is not a thing of a very distant future. It may be so, but we don't profess to know anything about it.
