MISCELLANEOUS.

There are eighty-two Mormon churches in Great Britain. Josh Billings (Henry Shaw) has garnered \$100,000 by his bad spelling.

Isaac W. Hayne, died on Wednesday, aged seventy years. He was Attorney General of South Carolina for twenty years preceding reconstruction.

According to a Washington correspondent, who pretends to know the drift of public sentiment there, the nomination of Grant is generally conceded.

The spelling reformers in England propose to abolish the letter c as wholly superfluous. They claim that c is always pronounced like k or s, or is silent.

Under the law abolishing slavery in Cuba, which has passed both branches of the Spanish Cortes, slavery will entirely cease in that island within ten years.

The total coinage for the United States for February, as shown by the Mint report, was \$8,169,969. Of that amount, \$5,300,400 was in standard silver dollars.

A man named McClern, recently stole \$800 from a woman with whom he had been living at Walla Walla, Washington Territory, and left. He was captured at Wellula, and the money found in his boot.

Charles Johnson and wife are on trial at Shasta, charged with having caused the death of Charles Herriner, a helpless and half idiotic boy. The body showed bruises, and warranted a verdict of death from neglect and ill-treatment.

A robbery of \$125,000 in bullion was accomplished at Sydney, Nebraska, on the 10th. About \$112,000 was recovered, it being left in the cellar of the express office by the thieves, who were unable to carry it off, owing to its weight.

Most remarkable results have attended the trials lately made in Paris with electricity as a means of controlling vicious horses. The application is made with a small electrical apparatus which can be easily manipulated by the driver.

A dispatch from Portland, Oregon, says: A horrible cutting affair is reported from the Penitentiary at Salem. A convict named Jerry Weston received several and perhaps fatal injuries at the hands of his cell-mate, John McComb.

F. F. Thomas, a resident of Ward, has commenced work on the Robinson Copper Mining and Smelting Company's property at Robinson. A. R. Watson has taken a contract to extract ore from the mine of the company.

Ireland is not the only country that is suffering from famine. The German province of Upper Silesia is said to be in great distress, owing to the failure of the crops and the intensely cold weather.

Carrier pigeons are not quite up to fast railroad trains in speed. Three pigeons flew from Baltimore to Washington recently, for a prize, and the swiftest one made the trip of forty miles in one hour.

A young woman residing near Mason City, Ill., has made a formal complaint before Bishop Spaulding of the Peoria Diocese, charging Thomas Duggan, a parish priest at Delavan, with committing an outrage upon her while she was acting as his housekeeper.

The Salt Lake Tribune asserts that Eli H. Murray, the new Governor of Utah, will occupy no middle ground on the Mormon question, and that his "vivacious wife believes the Mormon system a disgrace to decent morals and civilization, which finds its parallel in Turkey, but not in America."

Wm. H. Vanderbilt has redeemed his promise of a 10 per cent increase in the wages of the employes of the New York Central and Hudson Railroad Company.
