THE ROYAL ILLUSIONISTS.—Those who attended the entertainment of Thorpe & Darwin the royal illusionists, at the Opera House last evening, were mystified and delighted at the cleverness of their tricks. Mr. Thorne as a prestidigitator, is fully the equal of Hermann, and in some respects his superior, as he does his sleight of hand without the aid of trap tables. His dexterity with a pack of cards is marvelous. One of his most astonishing deceptions is the flying cage trick. He appeared at the footlights with a small wicker cage in his hands containing a live canary bird. Suddenly cage and bird disappeared like a flash, and in response to an encore the trick was repeated in the midst of the audience. The Davenport cabinet mystery, was probably the most interesting portion of the performance. The gentlemen use a three-door cabinet, similar to that in which Baldwin and other mediums perform. Last evening a committee, consisting of Messrs. Wasson, King and Marshall, was selected by the audience to tie the illusionists in the cabinet. This was carefully done and the knots sealed. As soon as the doors were closed a perfect din of noise followed. The sounds ceased and on opening the doors the men were found tied as before. The cabinet was then left open and the manner of doing the trick shown. The illusionists will appear for the last time to-night, and are well worth seeing.
