THE NEWS IN CARSON.

HOW THE GRANT AND BLAINE MEN RECEIVED IT YESTERDAY—THE SIDE WALK POLITICIANS IN CLOVER

The excitement yesterday over the news from the Chicago convention took possession of everybody. As there is over two hours difference between the time of Chicago and Carson, news was looked for as early as 8 o'clock in the morning...

When the result of the first ballot was brought down from the telegraph office and posted up in front of the Court House the Grant men began to yell on seeing that their favorite led the van, and was twenty lengths ahead of Blaine.

The general run of the sidewalk went about as follows: Cap Lyons—Wait till you see the second ballot. Judge Harris—Oh yes, just wait. Sam Wright—Thing look our way. Uncle Fraser—There'll be a gude market if Grant gets it.

Here Chris Zabriskie came rushing up with the second ballot, which showed that Grant had gained one vote and Blaine had lost two. Hill examined the dispatch as if he were handling a counterfeit hundred dollar bill and retired to Couter's store where he ordered a chocolate and lemon and drank two glasses before he felt in a condition to go out in the street.

Then came the third ballot where Grant lost one and the Blaine men were in high spirits while the Grant adherents had less to say than before, except that they looked upon one vote more or less as a mere trifle anyhow and not amounting to much.
