THE DISTRICT JUDGESHIP.

The selection of a man to preside over the District Court is a matter which should rise above any political consideration. It should be in reality a non-partisan office and in no way subservient to the revolutions of political machinery. There is no office on the ticket which requires so much care in the selection of an incumbent as this, and there is no position which gives a dishonest man such a chance for evil. The proper administration of justice requires a thorough knowledge of the law, coupled with a cool head and a mind as free as possible from bias or prejudice. Every man, irrespective of party, has the right to get all the justice that honestly administered courts can give him, and there should be no one on the bench who has political friends to reward or enemies to punish. Where can be found a right minded voter who will not freely admit that for such an office he would rather support a good man of the opposing party than a bad man in his own? This is the feeling which everywhere prevails and speaks well for the fact that political partisanship has not yet blinded the eyes of men to such a well admitted principle of decency. The fact that voters are not as a rule governed by party considerations in choosing between candidates to whom they are likely to apply for correct decisions in matters of law, should impress upon the convention the importance as well as the necessity of selecting a man upon whose name no shadow of suspicion can be cast. A strong nomination is likely to be made by the Democrats and we can only hope for success by going into the fight with the very best judicial material to be found in Ormsby and Douglas counties.
