

THE PUBLIC DOMAIN.

How the Railroads are Gubbing It Up.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The following letter was yesterday written and delivered by Senator Van Wyack in person to the Secretary of the Interior:

Dear Sir: When your order was made recognizing the New Orleans Pacific Railway Company's title to land grants many years forfeited, I felt it my duty to ask your Department to be informed of the progress of proceedings, with the view to oppose any further legislation and to prevent further absorption of the public domain by a corporation which had not even the semblance of legal or equitable right, and also

TO PROTECT THE SETTLERS

Who have been occupying and improving portions of this dead grant. The New Orleans, Baton Rouge and Vicksburg Railroad Company in 1871 obtained a large grant of land on the condition "that said company shall complete the whole of said road within five years from the passage of this Act." The five years expired, and not a mile had been built—not even a survey made, nor a definite location. The company's only act was to issue and distribute bonds among parties who were intent on "developing the country." Five years more pass, and the grant is doubly dead—yet not a mile constructed or definitely located. Its next act was in December, 1882, to assign what it did not own to another company, which was organized by the Legislature of Louisiana in 1876 to build through substantially the same section without the expectation of any aid. This company is known as the New Orleans Pacific, which finally drifted into the hands of a syndicate, who had also been patriotically

"DEVELOPING THE COUNTRY,"

So that millions of dollars and millions of acres had rewarded their sacrifices and exertions. It became necessary for the systems of roads which this syndicate controlled to connect with New Orleans. They built without any assurance of aid from the Land Department or from Congress, not even being a map of defining the location of any portion of the road; they knew only that Congress could revitalize the dormant grant. It was great presumption—even for a railway corporation—to assume that this could be accomplished simply by their fiat, and now they hope to forestall action by this recognition they have obtained from your department. They must well know that the title to these lands is not complete till final action by Congress. I realize your embarrassment when Congress at its last session failed to act, as the Attorney General had given to your department, in response to a request of your predecessor, an opinion that the company had a right to said grant.

A WARNING TO THE PUBLIC.

"There is an additional necessity for this notice, for that present company, the New Orleans Pacific, are about issuing mortgage-bonds on the basis of this forfeited land grant, and they naturally desire it legalized long enough to place these bonds on the market. So the victims are to be the people—the settlers on that portion of the public domain—or the purchasers of the bonds. My object is that Congress shall not be met next session with the plea that innocent purchasers bought these bonds and they should be protected.
"You will allow me to make this public, as my purpose is to aid the public and prevent imposition by the sale of bonds secured by a forfeited title which may be declared worthless."

TELEGRAPHIC JOBS.

At Newmarket, Eng., yesterday, the Barwell stakes, for three-year-olds, was won by J. R. Keene's Blue Grass, Alexander Willis's Arab second, and Lord Roseberry's Blue Gown third. There were five starters.

James Rigney, a San Francisco pioneer, who had lived for thirty-one years in the same house, fell over a bluff at Telegraph Hill on Monday night and was killed. The accident was caused by rains undermining the path.

Chief Brooks of the United States Secret Service Division, United States Treasury, has notified his subordinates of the existence of counterfeit \$5 National Bank currency. It is a new bill, bearing the portrait of Garfield.

Work was resumed to-day on the Washington monument, and before the season closes it is expected 100 feet will be added to the shaft, which now towers about 320 feet in the air. Stone cutters have been for several years engaged in dressing the marble prior to its being placed in position, and everything is in readiness for active operations.

R. C. Coleman, a member of the famous American rifle team that shot the international match in Europe a few years ago, met with a serious accident in New York Saturday. Together with several other gentlemen he was at the rifle range practicing, in the hope of making a qualifying score to enter into competition in the matches at Creedmoor in May, that are to decide the team which shall go to Europe in July. In closing the breech-lock of his rifle it caught a projecting cap in the cartridge, exploding it, and a piece of the cap entered his right eye, seriously cutting it. The attending surgeons fear that he will lose the use of the eye.
