JOHN CHINAMAN.

Our Pacific Coast Nuisance in the East

NEW YORK, May 10.—A vigorous warfare has been begun by the Young Men's Catholic Society, of the Transfiguration Church, against the evil practices of the Chinese in the vicinity of their rooms. It resulted in the closing by the police last night of the opium joints in the neighborhood. Two young girls and a Chinaman were arrested—one of the girls upon the complaint of her brother.

REVOLTING PRACTICES.

The Truth says: From an investigation recently made it is found that the Chinese quarter in Mott and Pell streets is visited by the most revolting practices. Not satisfied with the opium haunts and gambling dens, these Chinese demons have been setting their traps successfully for little girls of respectable parentage, who on the average are not more than eleven or fourteen years old. There are still many respectable persons living in the Chinese quarter, and those who have not had to what terrible fate the Chinese are bringing many innocent young girls have determined to put a stop to the hideous practices if possible. In the midst of the colony is the Catholic Church of the Transfiguration, which is at the corner of Mott and Park streets. Across the street from the church are the rooms of the Young Men's Catholic Association, which is connected with it. At the monthly meeting of the Association, which was held last evening, something was done to abate the evil. A resolution was offered for the appointment of a committee to wait upon Anthony Comstock and other agents of societies for the repression of crime, and call their attention to the existence of such an awful state of affairs. One of the members, in speaking to a Truth reporter, said: "This is something frightful. We have seen how matters were going, and have rescued one or two of the girls. Why, the orgies that these Chinese have been guilty of could hardly be described in print!"

The Herald says: In an article published in another column will be found statements which, if true or exaggerated, demand instant investigation by the authorities. We refer to the opium dens of Mott and Pell streets, into which are decaying young girls and mere children, who soon become victims of the opium habit and are speedily ruined, morally and physically. The statements made by Father Barry can be easily investigated. He expresses himself ready and determined to fight the evil, which is annually ruining hundreds of young people in this parochial district. Let him be called on for his facts, and an investigation be held at once. If one-half of what he says is true, the opium dens of New York have already fastened upon the city a curse which it will be hard to eradicate in years.

GETTING NEW LIGHT ON THE CHINESE.

NEW YORK, May 10.—As the facts concerning the habits of New York's Chinese inhabitants are being brought to light the community is beginning to realize for the first time what the Pacific coast has been suffering for years from the same source. The policemen in the vicinity of the Chinese quarters in Mott street give the Chinese a very bad character. According to one intelligent officer they are worse than the Italians (their predecessors) ever dreamed of being. In their present habits they are considered by the police to be a good deal lower than beasts, and every respectable person whom the reporter saw agreed that they were a curse to the neighborhood and the cause of untold misery and disease. Wherever the police have attempted to interfere, political influence has been exerted to protect the Chinese. One of the members of the Transfiguration Association said, after the meeting last night, that he went to Police Captain Petty, in the Elizabeth-street station, and informed him that scores of young girls were being decoyed into the Chinese opium shops and there ruined, whereupon Petty threatened to lock him up if he did not leave the station at once.

On Sunday the place swarms with Chinamen from all parts of the city and from out of town who make the neighborhood a perfect hell. Women and young girls cannot go through it without being insulted in the vilest manner. Every evening white women and girls can be seen coming out of the Chinese dens, staggering from the effects of debauchery. From the rooms of the Association mentioned sights are seen almost every night which the members can no longer tolerate. Father Barry estimates that not less than a hundred little white girls have been irretrievably ruined there within the last year.

THE SAME STORY FROM CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, May 10.—It is well known that in almost every Chinese laundry in the city there are special facilities for those desiring to "hit the pipe." Dens are visited every day by white men and women, and several of the latter have been outraged by Chinamen while under the effects of the drug.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 10.—

There was a sad accident last night at a fire in a livery stable on Chapel street. After the fire was nearly extinguished, the men of the horse-carriage were ordered away from the wall. As they were leaving the wall fell, and crushed seven of the men. Augustus Hyland and James H. Finnegan will die. J. G. Lewis, Edward Warren, David J. Schlanders, Geo. B. Catlin and L. Jackson were more or less seriously injured. The men were lifted from the ruins and taken to their homes. The fire is thought to have been the work of an incendiary.

El Paso, May 10.—

Neither the Mexican nor our officers have yet received intelligence of or from General Crook. Colonel U. de, at Paso del Norte, has directed the establishment of a courier line from Janas to Corralito, on the Mexican Central railway. It is in this direction that the Mexicans expect to receive their first definite news, but our officers believe that Crook will communicate to from Guadalupe canyon.

BALTIMORE, May 10.—A fire occurred this morning in the back building of the residence of the Adams family on Madison street. Mr. Adams, an old gentleman, paralyzed, was suffocated, and a colored cook burned to death. The colored house girl jumped from the third story window and broke her arm, and otherwise severely injured herself.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 10.—The indications are that the High-License bill is practically killed in the St. Legislature. Yesterday an attempt was made in the House to call it up out of its regular order, without success, and it is so low on the calendar that it cannot be reached in time before the final adjournment.
