FOREIGN NEWS.

Brady Hanged.

DUBLIN, May 14.—Joe Brady was hanged at 8 o'clock this morning. A vast concourse gathered outside the prison yard, in which Brady was executed. A strong force of cavalry, infantry and police was present to preserve order. There was no attempt at disturbance, however. A wreath of flowers was received by Brady, to which was attached a card bearing expressions of grief at his fate, from Irishmen living in Liverpool.

Brady made no statement to the jail Chaplain or to the Governor of the prison. One of the last things he did was to write a letter to his mother. He carried a prayer-book in his hand to the scaffold and was thoroughly resigned and firm. His body fell nine feet and his death was instantaneous.

The number of persons in the crowd outside the jail was estimated to reach 100,000. The throng is said to have been even greater than any of those which collected when executions were public.

At the moment the black flag—the signal that the drop had fallen—was seen over the jail, a cry was raised of "Hiats off!" and every head was uncovered. The crowd shortly afterwards dispersed quietly.

Bycoting the Jurors.

DUBLIN, May 14.—Nearly all the tradesmen of Dublin have received a circular which is termed "Analysis of the Special Juries in Eighteen Trials under the Crimes Act." Inclosed with each circular was a slip containing the words: "Woe to you if you have any of the goods of these jurors, for you and likewise they will have the blood and suffering of innocent people on your heads." The slip was signed "By Hook or Crook." A great sensation has been caused by this latest movement on the part of the friends of the Irish people.

PANAMA, May 14.—The Minister of the Treasury has ordered the Canal Company that they must pay the expenses of keeping between 2,000 and 3,000 men on the Isthmus to maintain order. He estimates that the cost thus imposed on the company during the fourteen years required for the completion of the canal will amount to \$7,000,000, and might even reach \$12,000,000.
