

Decoration Day.

The Dayton Times has the following:

"Why would it not be well to call a meeting of patriotic people and take measures for the proper observance of Memorial Day? There is no reason why we should sit supinely by while Virginia, Carson, Reno and many other towns of less importance than Dayton are going to observe the day in a benefiting manner. There is talent enough here for eloquent and original contributions towards the literary exercises. Even if this could not be done the example of Carson could be followed and the school children prevailed upon to read the oration and poem of some eloquent author. But there is no necessity of that. Let those who are willing to take a hand in this matter hold a meeting at the Court-house this evening and appoint a committee to arrange a programme for the becoming observance of Decoration Day.

It would be well also to remember the Fort Churchill dead. It is a shame that the graves of the gallant boys in blue at the Fort should remain in such a dilapidated state, and be isolated and neglected in the Decoration Day observances. It is a disgrace and a reproach to our patriotism. There is no need of this neglect. It is true the Fort is twenty miles from here and that there are few residents in its immediate vicinity, but there are a good many people living on the ranches within a radius of from five to ten miles, and they might well spare one day in the year to pay the well-earned tribute of respect and veneration to the memory of the twenty odd brave and gallant soldiers buried there on that bleak, barren hillside. But if patriotism has left that vicinity we think that Supt. Yerington would give the people of Dayton greatly reduced rates on the C. & C. if requested, should our people arrange for an excursion to the Fort on Decoration Day for the purpose of decorating those lonely graves. Let it not be said that Fort Churchill is the only place in the Union where the last resting place of the brave soldiers remains neglected and forgotten year after year on this day.

A Battle Mountain Beauty.
