THE NOTED KU KLUX KLAN

Their Masquerading Outfit—Some of their Cheestly Tricks.

The last number of the Century presents a ludicrous history of the Ku Klux Klan from which a few extracts are taken:

The Klan had a large membership; it exerted a vast and terrifying power, but its influence was never at any time dependent on, or proportioned to, its membership. It was in the mystery in which the comparatively few enshrouded themselves.

One or two incidents will illustrate the methods resorted to, to play upon the superstitious fears of the negroes and others. At the parade in Pulaski, while the procession was passing a corner on which a negro man was standing, a tall horseman in hideous garb turned aside from the line, dismounted and stretched out his bridle-rein toward the negro, as if he desired him to hold his horse.

Such tricks gave rise to the belief—still prevalent among the negroes—that the Ku Klux could take themselves all to pieces whenever they wanted to. Some of the Ku Klux carried skeleton hands. These were made of bone or wood, with a wrist or handle long enough to be held in the hand, which was concealed by the sleeve of the gown.
