**CRACKEDNESS IN CARSON.**

Ormsby county contains the capital of Nevada, and the Federal Courts of the Judicial District, comprising the whole State, hold their sessions at Carson. As the United States Government has no building in the city suitable for a Court-room, the Federal officials rent a portion of the Ormsby county court-house for the use of the United States Courts. A recent Grand Jury discovered that the County Treasury had not been increased for five years by the rents from the Federal Government, and so reported to the Court. This led to an investigation, and, of course, a call on the Government for the back rent. The Government through United States District Attorney Coffin, responded by exhibiting receipts for the rent alleged to be due. As the county authorities cannot, or at least do not, account for the money, and the receipts show conclusively that it was stolen by somebody who was authorized to handle it. As it would be impolitic to charge any of the living officers with appropriating the money, they accuse a dead one named Fraser, of the act, and as he cannot refute the charge it will doubtless pass unchallenged. The amount stolen is said to be \$3,500—Silver State.

**OUT WITH THE MUGWUMPS.**
