THE RUSSIAN HOG.

There is a good deal of talk about the advance of the Russian Bear toward the South, in search of new territory. From the manner in which Russia has acted during the last few hundred years we submit that the term Hog, is better adapted to the national characteristics. She has kept edging down toward India for nearly two hundred years, and during that time has actually stretched her surveyor's line over two thousand miles. We make a great hue and cry whenever the big railroad men appropriate a few million acres of land, but this Hog of the earth has rooted along for two thousand miles and hasn't stopped yet.

In 1836 she took the largest slice of any, and in '63 '67 '74 '76 '81 and '84. Russia grabbed more territory, marching over parallels of latitude as if they had been furrows in a cowfield. It will be noticed however that she took smaller bits of the pie each time, for fear of alarming England. M., San Francisco time, on Wednesday, April 29th, 1895. At which time and places they will be opened in the presence of bidders, for furnishing and delivery of military supplies during the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1895, as follows: Wood at Fort Bidwell, Fort Gaston and San Diego Barracks, Cal., and Forts Halleck and McDermitt, Nevada. Also, at the same time, at this office only, for military supplies for the same period, as follows: Wood, and anthracite, bituminous, and blacksmith's coal, at Presidio of San Francisco; wood and bituminous coal at Benicia Barracks; kindling wood, and bituminous and blacksmith's coal at San Francisco; kindling wood and bituminous coal at Alcatraz Island; and bituminous coal at Angel Island, and Forts Mason and Winfield Scott, Cal.
