THE NEW LAND LAW.

An Act to Prevent the Unlawful Occupancy of Public Lands.

Col. H. C. DeAhna, the Special Land Agent of the General Land Office, has handing the APPEAL the following for publication, together with a letter from the Washington authorities requesting that the law be given the widest publication in the daily papers. It is a law of considerable importance and will effect several land grabbers in the State.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all inclosures of any public lands in any State or Territory of the United States, heretofore or hereafter made, erected or constructed by any person, party, association, or corporation, to any of which land included within the enclosure the person, party, association or corporation, making or controlling the enclosure had no claim or color of title made or acquired in good faith, or an asserted right thereto by or under claim, made in good faith with a view to entry thereof at the proper land-office under the general laws of the United States at the time any such enclosure was or shall be made, are hereby declared to be unlawful, and the maintenance, erection, construction or control of any such inclosure is hereby forbidden and prohibited; and the assertion to the right to the exclusive use and occupancy of any part of the public lands of the United States, in any State or any of the Territories of United States without claim, color of title, or asserted right as above specified as to enclosure, is likewise declared unlawful, and hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. That it shall be the duty of the District Attorney of the United States for the proper district, on affidavit filed with him by any citizen of the United States that section one of this act is being violated showing a description of the land inclosed with reasonable certainty, not necessarily by metes and bounds nor by Governmental sub divisions of surveyed lands, but only so that the enclosure may be identified, and the persons guilty of the violation as nearly as may be, and by description, if the name cannot on reasonable inquiry be ascertained, to institute a civil suit in the proper United States District or Circuit Court, or Territorial District Court, in the name of the United States, and against the parties named or described who shall be in charge of or controlling the inclosure complained of as defendants; and jurisdiction is also hereby conferred on any United States District or Circuit Court or Territorial District Court having jurisdiction over the locality where the land inclosed, or any part thereof, shall be situated, to hear and determine proceedings in equity, by writ of injunction, to retain violations of the provisions of this act; and it shall be sufficient to give the Court jurisdiction if service of original process be had in any civil proceeding on any agent or employee having charge or control of the inclosure; and any suit brought under the provisions of this section shall have precedence for hearing and trial over other cases on the civil docket of the Court, and shall be tried and determined at the earliest practicable day. In any case if the inclosure shall be found to be unlawful, the Court shall make the proper order, judgment or decree for the destruction of the inclosure, in a summary way unless the inclosure be removed by the defendant within five days after the order of the Court.

SEC. 3. That no person, by force, threats, intimidation, or by any fencing or enclosing, or any other unlawful means, shall prevent or obstruct, or shall combine and confederate with others to prevent or obstruct, any person from peaceably entering upon or establishing a settlement or residence on any tract of public land subject to settlement or entry under the public land laws of the United States, or shall prevent or obstruct free passage or transit over or through the public lands: Provided, This section shall not be held to effect the right or title of persons, who have gone upon, improved or occupied said lands under the land laws of the United States, claiming title thereto in

good faith.

SEC. 4. That any person violating any of the provisions hereof, whether as owner, part owner, agent, or who shall aid, abet, counsel, advise or assist in any violation hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and fined in a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars and be imprisoned not exceeding one year for each offence.

SEC. 5. That the President is hereby authorized to take such measures as shall be necessary to remove and destroy any unlawful inclosure of any of said lands, and to employ civil or military force as may be necessary for that purpose.

SEC. 6. That where the alleged unlawful inclosure includes less than one hundred and sixty acres of land, no suit shall be brought under the provisions of this act without authority from the Secretary of the Interior.

SEC. 7. That nothing herein shall effect any pending suits to work their discontinuance, but as to them hereafter they shall be prosecuted and determined under the provisions of this act. Approved, February 25th, 1885.

STRYCHNINE THROWERS.

They Still Pursue Their Contemptible Calling.

For several weeks past the parties who have undertaken to kill all the valuable dogs in the city have been keeping up their work. Yesterday morning the proprietor of the APPEAL had a calf poisoned in his yard. The animal died in great agony, showing all the symptoms of strychnine poison. This is the third calf belonging to the writer that has been poisoned on his premises, during the past year, and three separate attempts were made to kill a horse belonging to him. A few days ago Mrs. Curry found a piece of bread and butter in her yard, which had been thrown over the fence. It was covered on the butter side with enough arsenic to have killed a dozen persons. Had a young child found the bread and eaten a single mouthful, it would have been dead in a few minutes. The wretches who are distributing arsenic about the city are daily jeopardizing human beings, and should be hunted down and summarily dealt with. The members of the Sporting Club have offered a reward for the arrest and conviction of these parties, and the club should ascertain from the druggists of the city the names of parties who have purchased strychnine or other poison, and publish these names in the newspapers of the city, leaving the public to judge just how near the parties named may be capable of such work.

LOCATING A LAKE.

Locations Made On Owens Lake With the Object of Obtaining Borax and Soda.

Almost, if not quite, the whole shore of Owens Lake has been located. The power of attorney for making these locations was granted to L. F. J. Wrinkle of Virginia City, and bears the names of 830 locators. The fees for recording the locations amount to \$225 50. That much, at least, is assured to the county for the present. If the only object of making these locations was to make evaporating tanks for getting the matter held in solution in the water of the lake, then a mile or two of the shore would afford ample room for the most extensive operations that could be well conducted. By locating the entire circumference of the lake it might appear that the locators expect the entire lake to dry up, and they want to secure all the enormous amount of matter that would be left in its bed. Before the bed of the lake could be come dry, Owens river would have to be diverted from its present course and be disposed of in some other way. This implies irrigation on a scale of such magnitude that it is not likely to be undertaken soon. In any event, if these locations will develop any new industries in the county, and promote the utilization of any of the natural resources, the county will be the gainer thereby, and the locators or promoters, no matter who these may be, should have the good wishes of the citizens of the county, and general countenance and support in their work.-Inyo Independent.

THE MARRIAGE CONTRACT.

How the Expert Proposes to Take a Speck of Ink.

A Post reporter called upon expert Piper, on Wednesday, and asked how he proposed to remove the ink from Sharon's alleged marriage contract, without injuring the paper.

"I can take a speck of ink from the hair line of a letter, so that you cannot discover the spot from which it was taken," replied the expert, "and I will show you how it is done."

Dr. Piper then took one of Mr. Sharon's checks and placed a magnifying glass over the signature. Then, with a steel blade as thin as tissue paper and as sharp as a razor, he removed a speck of the ink from one of the finest lines in the name. The spot from which he took the ink was so small that it could scarcely be discovered with the naked eye. Keeping the speck of ink on the steel blade and under the magnifying glass, to know where it was, he produced a delicate piece of glass and transferred the ink to it. He mounted it in the usual manner for the microscope.

"That is all I wish to do with the 'Dear Wife' letter," he said. "It will not mutilate or destroy the tissue of the paper, or the finest hair line of the writing."

Under the microscope the speck of ink, which seemed to be only black to the naked eye, was a deep violet, the instrument bringing out the color perfectly.

Brought to Time.

A Chicago dispatch says: The published statement is made that when Miss Nevada, a prima donna of Mapleson's company, first appeared in New York she was to receive \$1,000 a night, but when she at first failed to score a success Mapleson reduced the figure to \$300. In San Francisco, she proved a drawing card and compelled the impresario to allow her \$1,000. Arriving here she was again reduced to \$300. Just before the hour for the presentation of the opera last night, it is stated that she refused to appear unless the full figure was allowed and that Mapleson had to give her the amount to prevent a change of opera at the last moment.

Profits in the Cattle Business.

Meagher county, M. T., has a resident who commenced the cattle business fifteen years ago with sixty dairy cows, who marketed \$19,000 worth of beaves last year. The result of two year's growth and whose herd is now worth fully \$150,000, the annual product of which may be set down at \$12,000 for the next five years, and then raised to \$15,000 for the succeeding five years.
