A STYLISH COW.

She Sports Gold Plated Teeth.

Yesterday the APPEAL received from Belleville, the gold plated tooth of a cow, which was killed for beef recently, near Bishop Creek, by Mr. Goodwin, a butcher of that vicinity. The tooth is about two inches long, and the portion below where the gums were, is coated with gold, except the crown of the tooth, which shows no gold except in two cavities. This would naturally be the result of grinding the upper and lower teeth together. The theory is that the cow got the gold plating by drinking water which held gold in solution. The cow had been for years feeding along the banks of Bishop Creek and its tributaries. The letter accompanying the tooth states that all of the teeth in the cow's jaw were covered with the metal. The tooth was shown to Dr. Southworth, who said that he did not believe that the metal had been placed there artificially. His opinion was that it accumulated through perhaps several years by being deposited from gold held in solution.

Unprinted and Unknown Laws.

While it may be, in a sense, right for a Legislature to have a bill become a law immediately upon its receiving favorable consideration at their hands and the signature of the Governor, yet where there is no immediate necessity for such a law and where it effects the general people of the State, as does, for instance, the Anti-Treating enactment, we believe it is nothing more than equity to the people and to the dispensers of justice that the enforcement of such a law be deferred until a time sufficient to allow the law to be printed and distributed throughout the State. Were any cases to come before our courts in which questions of recently enacted and prevailing laws arise it would be mutually embarrassing to all concerned to know how to proceed until the law in legal form would be produced, and to produce it before it is printed is out of the question. The Anti-Treating law has been declared unconstitutional by a Justice of the Peace, who, when a case under the enactment came before him stated that he never had, nor could he obtain from the proper parties, a copy of the law as passed by the Legislature and as signed by the Governor. He interviewed two honorables who had voted for the measure or law, and they could give him no definite information concerning it. There appeared to him no other course to pursue than to dismiss his prisoner and declare the law unconstitutional. There is something radically wrong and short-sighted about this, and law-makers would do well to make provisions which would allow all subject to the penalties of, and those dispensing justice under a new law, to become acquainted with its character before it be enforced.—Sentinel.

There used to be a law requiring the publication of the laws in the newspapers, but it was repealed by a lot of lunk-heads who feared the papers might make some money out of it. The repealing of the act has cost the State many thousands of dollars.

The new Road Wagon.

Some time ago the APPEAL gave what it thought was a very full description of the new road wagon invented by Mr. Torreyson of this city, whose idea was to give the horse the benefit of a shelter from the sun, and to also lift him off the ground when going down hill, giving him absolute rest and a free ride to rest his weary limbs. So many letters of inquiry, however, have been received regarding this vehicle, that we have decided to illustrate the modus operandi of the invention that any one may see at a glance just how the thing works. The cut, upon which our artist has taken more than usual pains, represents Mr. Torreyson's first trial trip with the wagon, Jan. 2d,

1885. Our artist, who was present by invitation at the trial trip, caught the scene just at the first big bend on the grade near the pine tree, about half a mile below Saint's Rest. Mindful of the importance of properly depicting the running gear of the wagon, he has not allowed his pencil to be lured away from the work of man to depict the handiwork of nature, and none of the cloud-capped, snow-crested mountains, or stately pines are represented. Mr. Torreyson has just wound up the horse and is now starting the vehicle down the grade.
