Keene, the famous ex-operator of Pine street, and of late years a conspicuous figure among the bulls and bears of Wall street, New York, is on his way to Virginia, and will be here the latter part of the week. Alvinza Hayward, the quartz conqueror of California, and W. S. Hobart, his trusty coadjutors are here already. The air is thick with rumors of other mining magnates being on the way. Dispatches have been received from leading bankers of New York in the last few days, inquiring for dead points on the Hale & Norcross. ## MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.

Henry Vansickle of Genoa Missing Since Last Tuesday.

Henry Vansickle, a rancher, who has been known in Carson Valley for some twenty years, has been missing since Tuesday last, and all trace of his whereabouts has been lost. He left his home on Tuesday and came to this city with a wagon load of farm produce. He had recently purchased the old Haines ranch at the foot of Kingsbury Grade, and there were some papers in the transfer which H. M. Yerington had to sign. The papers were signed at the V. & T. office in the afternoon, after which Vansickle went to Mark Harris' store and drew fifty dollars. He then passed up the street and nothing has been heard of him since. On Monday his family became alarmed and came to the city to ascertain his whereabouts. They had supposed all along that he might have gone to San Francisco, but the ticket agent at the depot had sold him no ticket, and the conductors on the road, who are well acquainted with him, report that they did not see him on the train. His friends have telegraphed and written letters to the points where he is likely to be, but nothing has been learned of his whereabouts. Yesterday one of his hired men took his team from Carney's hay yard where it had been left by Vansickle on Tuesday. He had a drove of cattle which he had contracted to deliver to Kirman & Rickey on Saturday, they were not delivered and it is conceded by all who know him that nothing but some extraordinary circumstance would have prevented him delivering the cattle according to agreement, as his business habits are very precise. At the time of his disappearance he could not have had more than \$300 upon his person.

### Peculiar Petitions.

There are 53,000 post-offices in the United States, and it is estimated that there is an average of three applicants for every office. Some of the petitions sent to the Department by would-be postmasters are curiosities. One from a woman in central Illinois, asks that she be appointed in place of her husband, the incumbent, who is a Republican, while she is a Democrat. Her husband also vouches for her Democracy. A postmaster in southern Indiana writes to know if he cannot resign and have his wife, who is a Democrat, appointed as he is a Republican, who contributed to the campaign fund, and cannot consistently ask to be retained. Another Indian writes that he has purchased a drug store in his town and paid more for it than it is worth, in the expectation of being made postmaster. A Nebraska father and son are applicants for the same post office, and their petitions are embellished not only with the names of their endorsers, but contain a dissertation on the unfitness of each other for the office.

### Selection of Poultry.

The laying, or egg-producing features, are important in selection of the most profitable kinds of poultry. The Leghorns, all colors, are by far the best layers, and head the list, laying to the credit of each hen 200 eggs per year. The Dominique is also credited 200, and next on the list we find the Hamburgs, who with ordinary care, will yield 180. The favorite Plymouth Rocks hold the next place, furnishing 175. The black Cochins, Houdans, Black Spanish and Polish birds, are even in the race, each credited with 170. The common barn-yard fowls, so many of whom are thrown on their own resources at a tender age, and left there, can be relied on for 160, while the fine fat Brahmas are last on the list, 150. The light Brahmas and white Cochins are the largest and heaviest birds, and furnish the largest eggs.

## QUEER SPORT.

### Saber Blashing on Horse Back.

On Sunday last, Dr. J. J. Ross, the all round athlete, and Capt. U. E. Jennings had a horseback combat in San Francisco, Ross using a saber and Jennings a lance, which calls to mind the old-fashioned tournaments of the middle ages.

Each man wore a heavy wire mask and a cuirass. Jennings won the first point by striking Ross on the mask. The second point was won by Ross, and the third and fourth by Jennings. As the men rode up for the sixth bout, Ross swung his sword wildly, jabbing Jennings on the back of the head, inflicting a wound four inches long. Jennings felt the blood trickle down his neck, and then he dismounted to his dressing-room, and was attended by a physician. Ross, who greatly regrets the occurrence, says that he narrowly missed decapitating the Captain. Jennings, it appears, grazed Ross' arm with his lance, and bent his head in the effort to elude the sword and at the same instant to wheel his horse. The movement brought the lower part of Jennings' mask against his cuirass, and the mask fell off at the very instant that Ross swung his saber from right to left, or what is known as, "cut 2 at cavalry." Had he not stayed the sweep of the blade, the spectators would have had a bloody tragedy for their money, but the partially-averted blow was still forcible enough to inflict a cut which extended from the back of the left ear transversely to the neck. The wound is four inches long and the skull is fractured. Opinions as to the result of the wound differ, but it is acknowledged on all sides that it is very serious.

There is no law against these combats, but the police are always ready to rush in an stop a glove-match.

### Revolution in Favor of California Fruits.

New York, April 11.—A well-known jobber informs the editor of the American Grocer that there is a revolution impending in the foreign green fruit trade, resulting from the development of the California orange industry. It is undeniable that the trade in Mediterranean oranges west of Chicago and in the southwest, is slipping away from this port. The Western market is passing under the control of California shippers. The Southern route proposes to lay California oranges in the market nine days after shipment, at a cost which will enable them to be sold in competition with the Florida stock. The market is oversupplied with inferior grades of fruit, but better qualities of oranges and lemons are in demand, bringing as much as at any time this season. The cargoes of Palermo, Toronto and Messina oranges, landed here this month, were generally poor in quality and condition.

### The Wheat Crop.

New York, April 11.—The Financial Chronicle regards the prevailing views of the price of wheat extravagant. Without counting the California surplus and the good crops which now appear to be assured, the amount in the United States, and afloat for Europe is 22,000,000 more than last year. The Australian surplus will amount to 14,000,000 bushels. From some Western points, where the fall crop was pronounced winter-killed, came reports of good prospects. Finally there is no good reason why Russia, if prices advance, may not also market the remnant of her crops through Austria and Germany. Against these facts, about all there is to say is that the United Kingdom's visible stock is smaller than last year, London and Liverpool being about 6,000,000 bushels less.

### A Ghastly Discovery.

St. Louis, April 14.—A sensation was caused at the Southern Hotel this morning by finding in a room a trunk containing the headless body of a man, with a note within the trunk saying, "So perish all traitors to a great and mighty cause." The room was assigned on March 30th, to Walter H. Lennox of London, England.
