**THE DAYTON NEWSPAPERS.**

Some days ago the Chronicle called attention to the fact that the Dayton Times had offered to do the county printing for nothing and therefore ought to be boycotted.

The facts of the case are these: The Times, which is an old established paper in Dayton, has been able to make a fair living there, and has always charged the rates laid down by law for county printing.

A few months ago Senator Westerfield started a Democratic paper there, and in an unprofessional attempt to ruin his well established rival has taken the county printing away from the Times by "rattling" the rates. The Times retaliated with a proposition to do the work for nothing, not expecting to get it, but to put the Board of Commissioners on record.

The writer has always been personally friendly to Senator Westerfield, but here takes the liberty of giving him a little friendly advice—Mr. Westerfield having reached the age of fifty years, suddenly takes it into his head that he has a special talent for running a newspaper. He believes that without the slightest preliminary education or experience in the printing business he can start a newspaper and make a success of it.

He is by profession a mill man; and a very good one. Now what would he think if some man who did not know the difference between a Block's crusher and an amalgamating pan should apply to him for the Superintendency of a mill.

Westerfield knows no more about a newspaper than a mule does about a pan mill. The advent of such people into journalism is a great detriment to it and they should be discountenanced.

The rattling of living rates helps to make the profession unremunerative and demoralizes the business and everything connected with it. Senator Westerfield would certainly object to Boston capital coming into Nevada and setting up a mill to reduce ores at 50 cents a ton when the labor actually cost \$3. Such a proposition would be simply a freeze out one at best, just as Westerfield's newspaper proposition is already in Dayton. He does not expect to establish his own paper, but to freeze out the Times, and if the people of Lyon county allow it to be done they never again deserve to have a newspaper to represent their interests.

When Westerfield's paper cut the rates the APPEAL struck it from its exchange list, and all papers in this State who wish to discountenance this plan, and those who believe in fair remuneration for work should cease to exchange with the News Reporter and place it under boycott.

The News Reporter is placed in Dayton as an organ of James G. Fair, and it has already begun to rat rates.

The labor organizations of this State will preserve for future reference the fact that Senator Fair's temporary newspaper organs are already showing their hands by rattling established rates.

If Senator Westerfield wants to be recognized among journalists of good standing in this State, let him revise his scale of advertising rates and come into the field as a fair competitor.

**ACTIVE SILVER MEN.**

The Tribune says: Silver men have an organization which is known as the National Bi-Metallic Coinage Association, with headquarters at Washington, which they are using as a means of reaching voters in the East to influence public opinion in their favor. Senator Jones of Nevada is President. The Secretary is M. H. Slater. He was here recently and said: "We have one prime object to secure—free and unlimited coinage of silver, the same as gold. We have no war to make on gold; we believe we can educate the people to the belief in a bi-metallic standard, and that then our object will be accomplished. We advocate free coinage as the thing most likely to bring about bi-metallicism at once. Secretary Manning is not correct in his view—the suspension of silver coinage as necessary to force foreign nations into the bi-metallic conference. We are sending literature into all

the Eastern States to inform the people on the silver question. They write to us daily that they can get only one side of the silver question and want to hear both sides. Silver clubs are springing up in the East. There is a strong one at New Haven and all through the interior of New York they have been started."
