A CURIOUS RESULT.

There is one curious result of the strike of the street railroad men of New York, March last, which was won by the Knights of Labor. They struck for twelve hours of work and \$2 of wages, and every line in the city gave in to the demand. The Third Avenue men were foremost in the field at that time in waging the battle along with their brethren of the other lines. After a few weeks, the Third Avenue corporation began a war upon the Union to which it had just succumbed, so that the men had to go out again in self defense; but the corporation has finally succeeded in filling their places with "rats" from other cities. Here is where the curious part of the business comes in. These very rats are today enjoying the advantages which were gained at heavy cost by the Knights of Labor whom they have supplanted. That is to say, they are required to work but twelve hours a day instead of the fourteen or sixteen which preceded the March strike, and they are getting \$2 a day instead of the lower wages which were paid before the strike was won. The Knights of Labor on the Third Avenue line gained a triumph whose fruits are gathered by the enemies of the Order. The corporation cannot go back to the old system, though the men who broke it down are out of its service. The rats have got better terms than could ever have been obtained without the organization which they have done their best to undermine.

ENLARGING THE STATE.

The Austin Reville has the following, relative to the proposed enlargement of Nevada:

W. M. Stewart, a prominent Republican candidate for United States Senator, has a plan for enlarging the State of Nevada and thereby not only making our State numerically entitled to a Congressman, but also to give us a good standing in the galaxy of stars. This plan he recently outlined to this writer and is substantially as follows: It is conceded that Washington Territory will have the "pan-handle" of Idaho added to it. This will make it an impossibility for the rest of Idaho to become a State and as all the Territories are intended to eventually become States it is quite proper to add the rest of Idaho to Nevada. This would give us the Oregon Short Line for a long distance and much desirable land. Then the Mormon question can best be settled by dividing Utah up. Give the Western portion to Nevada so as to take in about half of Great Salt Lake. This will add a slice more of the Central Pacific Railroad to our State and some good mining and agricultural tracts. The rest of Utah to be divided between Colorado and Wyoming and good lines would be drawn in every case except the corner where Oregon joins on. Still the enlargement would not be anything like as big as Texas. Mr. Stewart thinks the scheme an entirely tenable one and if sent to the Senate will try and bring it about. Take a map and trace out the proposed State and see what you think of his plan.

DEADHEADISM.

The San Francisco World in discussing dead-headism, remarks that "dead-heads" is a term that oft times is applied to editors and reporters, meaning that they are admitted to the exhibition, or whatever it may be for their looks, or because they belong to the puffing profession, and many of the unthinking believe them to be a favored class of persons that have the right to go where they like, with out coming under the requirements of other persons; but what are the facts? Suppose an entertainment to be given (to illustrate), and that the editor is dead-headed to the amount of four tickets, which sell at twenty-five cents a piece, that is one dollar. The entertainment is to be puffed, and a man must be hired to write it, a compositor to set and a proof-reader to read the proof, and for this the editor has to pay out of his own pocket for those four tickets over four dollars. This

is a fact, to say nothing of the space it occupies in the paper which makes as much more. Hence when anyone else can get in for 25 cents, he, (because he is an editor), must pay about five dollars, and wear the beautiful title of "dead-head" to boot. It is a fine thing isn't it?

Three Judges of the First Judicial District, The appointment of a State Central Committee, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the Convention.
