THE CARSON IDEA.

Under the Judiciary Act passed by the last Legislature and declared to be constitutional by the Supreme Court, the whole State is to be comprised into one Judicial District, with three Judges, from the 1st of January next. If the new law has one redeeming feature that feature is, that the most competent men in the State, regardless of locality, who offer themselves for the Judgeship, might be nominated and elected. This, however is not the Carson idea as is shown by the Carson Tribune of that city, which says:

"As Eastern Nevada can only rightfully claim one of the three nominations for District Judge, there is liable to be a sharp contest in the Republican Convention between Bizlow and McKinney."

This shows that locality will figure to a much greater extent than ability in the nomination of candidates for District Judges, if the Carson idea prevails. Geography, not knowledge of the law, is to determine who shall or shall not be nominated, and sapheads, who happen to reside in counties, which it is desirable to conciliate, will be nominated over the heads of able jurists, whose geographical position, in the opinion of the ticket makers renders them unavailable. The "Carson idea" makes it necessary for aspirants for Judicial offices to study geography rather than law. - Silver State.

REVIVAL.

Nothing wiser has been said to Mr. Cleveland since he was elected than the words of Colonel McClure, the veteran and accomplished editor of the Philadelphia Times: "If there is no revival of business during your Administration," said McClure to Cleveland in an interview not long after election, "then your administration will be a failure, and the Democratic party will be beaten in the election of 1888. But if there is a speedy and flourishing revival of business under your administration, then you will be successful and the Democratic party will succeed in 1888."

A large portion of Mr. Cleveland's term of office has already passed away, and there is no revival of business as yet, nor any clear prospect thereof. "The cause of the evil," says the New York Sun, "is the maintenance of the gold standard of money. There can be no revival of business under a contracting standard. This is a principle which Mr. Cleveland would do well to lay to heart and ponder late and early."

The President Displeas'd.

WASHINGTON, June 25.-Yesterday was Cabinet meeting day. Promptly at noon the President walked into the Cabinet room where were present Secretaries Endicott and Whitney and Assistant Secretary Fairchild. The President looked at the empty chairs belonging to Messrs. Lamar, Garland, and Vilas, and said to those present: "Gentlemen, it is time for the Cabinet to assemble. There will be no Cabinet meeting today, as I have more urgent business to attend to, and I judge by the absence of some of the Cabinet that they have also." Mr. Cleveland then instructed Col. Lamont to notify the tardy members of his decision. They arrived twelve minutes later, and were greatly mortified when told of the President's displeasure.

Organizing Telegraph Unions.

New York, June 25.-Thomas O'Reilly, who has just been elected President of the Telegraphers' Union, said yesterday that he should start on a general tour all over the country the 1st of July. He will go to every city as far West as California, and all over Canada, where there are councils. He said that it was true that the Telegraphers' Union had gone over in a body to the Knights of Labor, although they maintain their distinct organizations.

Bogus Shorthorn Pedigree.

DETROIT, June 25.-The American Shorthorn Breeders' Association charges that William B. and Henry Mitchell, private bankers of this city, have furnished fraudulent pedigrees of certain shorthorns sold by them, the progeny of the cow Airdrie Duchess XI being mentioned. A resolution has been passed prohibiting the entry of any more animals by the Mitchells on the herd book of the Association,
