WHAT IS NEEDED IN NEVADA.

With all the rivers, creeks and lakes of the Sierras to draw upon, the people of Nevada are slow to engage in irrigation enterprises. Great acres of land that would become fertile and as valuable as any on the Pacific Coast are allowed to remain waste for lack of proper works to facilitate irrigation. In the business of irrigation our State is being left far behind by several of the Territories in the Eastward. In Wyoming a great work is now about completed by which no less than 60,000 acres of land will be furnished with an ample supply of water. This is the tunnel of the Wyoming Development Company, by means of which the waters of the Laramie will be made to swell those of the Sabille. The tunnel now lacks but 80 feet of completion and is being run through the hardest of gneiss rock. Its total length will be 3,000 feet. It will carry a volume of water 8 feet wide and 7 feet deep, with a flow of 1,500 cubic feet a second. The machinery used in the tunnel is driven by a Leffel-turbine wheel of 150 horse power, and the land will be broken up by steam plows. Already this season 500 acres have been devoted to experimental seeding, and crops of grain, alfalfa and all kinds of vegetables are flourishing finely. The best of the whole enterprise (for the Territory of Wyoming) is that the Company does not intend establishing a great farm to be managed by themselves. As soon as the land is brought under cultivation it will be cut into suitable farms and sold to individuals. It is easy to see what a populous and flourishing settlement will spring up on this tract of 60,000 acres of land. In Idaho and Montana similar irrigating enterprises are in progress. Although we are thus being left behind it is to be hoped that capitalists will presently see the opportunities that Nevada affords and start up works of similar character along the Sierras and in other places where water may be obtained and stored. There is no reason why such enterprises may not be made as profitable here as in the Territories to the Eastward, and capitalists who are looking for opportunities for profitable investments may find in Nevada many places where they may do what the Wyoming Development Company has done on the Laramie and Sabille.—Dayton News Reporter.
