ANOTHER GOOD FLOW.

It is struck on Geo. Cagwin's Premises.

Day before yesterday a fine flow of water was struck at a depth of 90 feet on Geo. Cagwin's premises by McLaughlin and Hawkins. Several flows were struck at shorter distances, but the borers pushed on finding each new flow an improvement on the other. Mr. Cagwin's well now flows in the neighborhood of 10,000 gallons a day giving Mr. Cagwin all the water he wants and a good deal more. It is clear and cold and the subject of great curiosity in the neighborhood. It flows from a solid five inch iron gas pipe.

The method employed by McLaughlin and Hawkins with the Ohio well borer is superior to all others yet introduced in this State. The sinking is done by steam and instead of boring the hole is sluiced out. A hollow rod with a drill at the end goes to the bottom and there are two holes in the drill through which the water spurts under heavy pressure.

This makes soft ground for the drill and the sand, gravel, etc., comes up between the casing and drill. When water is struck a double acting steam pump sluices out a large reservoir and sevens are put in to keep back the coarse gravel. This makes a permanent well of large capacity.

This is a great advantage over the galvanized jointed pipe. The latter by constant working of the joints in putting it down loosens the rivets and a chemical action takes place which makes the joints leak and the well finally becomes muddy from these leakages. The Ohio borer puts down a continuous length of gas pipe screwed together and capable of lasting for generations.

The Circus.

The Salt Lake Tribune has this to say of the Sells circus:

"Sells Bros.' circus visited this city yesterday and today will take its departure and also a pile of Salt Lake cash. The circus was a good one and gave entire satisfaction to the large crowd which made up its audiences. In the morning the streets were filled with people watching for the parade.

When it took place there was general satisfaction. The display included all of the old features of a circus street parade with some novelties. There were two brass bands, a drum and fife corps, with a long array of elephants, camels, fine horses and ponies.

There were two or three open cages with lions leopards and their tamers sitting bravely in their midst, and the always present caliope, which played "White Wings" instead of the "Sweet By and By," of former circus days. The performances were good in all respects. All the usual work of the arena was reproduced in good shape. Particularly praiseworthy were the trapeze acts, the tumbling and the contortion specialties, and there was the usual amount of good riding. All in all it was a good show.
