THE CRAWFORD PLAN.

A Correspondent who Takes Issue with the Proposition.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE APPEAL. I have read with some interest your proposition for electing a United States Senator. I have, like yourself, always believed in the fairness of the theory, but am of the opinion that it could not be practically applied. That is, certain exigencies might arise which would render it inoperative. For instance, suppose both parties adopted the plan and A got the largest number of votes in the State, then suppose B, an opponent on the other side, in politics, elected a Legislative ticket with enough hold-overs to make him Senator. Would the dominant party in the Legislature consider for a moment that there was any binding obligation in the plan not set down by the Constitution of the State, which provides how United States Senators must be elected? Assuming, however, that this contingency would not arise, under what conditions would the various candidates accept the proposition? AN INQUIRER.

Destructive to Young Pines.

It is next to impossible to secure a good second growth of pine trees in the Sierra Nevadas as long as sheep are permitted to range unrestricted over the mountains. They trample the young sprouts of two or three years growth into the ground and kill them. They feed on the tiny shoots the first year they appear. Even if they survive the first few years, the sheep men frequently set fire to the underbrush in order to clear the ground for feed. Fires are also started carelessly from the camp fires of the herders. All in all the trees have a tough time to attain maturity. Those who are interested in the subject of forestry would find it to their advantage to study this means of destruction of trees, which we firmly believe to be greater than all others, and seek a remedy by which such destruction can be prevented. -Truckee Republican.

How it stood.

The fight in the Democratic Convention against Adams ought to have been won if it had been properly handled. The Adams vote stood 58 and the opposite 67 thus beating Adams by 9 votes. These 67 votes were divided up between Mason, Hardin, Winters and Sadler and it was impossible to get them to unite on any one man. After an ineffective endeavor to bring about unity among the adherents of the four candidates they all withdrew giving Adams a clear field. It is now held that had all four of the opposing candidates stuck and gone before the Convention Adams' vote would have fallen away from him after the failure of his friends to have elected him on the first ballot, as many of the delegates said that they did not feel obliged to stay by him after the first and second ballot.

Going into Obscurity.

PARIS, Sept. 13.-The announcement that Mme. Adam, perhaps better known by her pen name of Juliet de Lambert, is about to retire from the editorship of the Nouvelle Revue will scarcely cause much surprise to those who have followed the course of events at Paris. In common parlance, Mme. Adam is played out. Her political salon is a thing of the past, and is shunned by all except ignorant diplomatic attaches, newly-arrived provincials and the outside edge of the Parisian press. The widow of a Republican Senator, who had made his money in disreputable speculations connected with the ill-fated Mexican expedition, she made her first attempts to imitate the political salons of former times in the days following the recapture of Paris after the termination of the Commune. Having become acquainted with the popular tribune Gambetta, many prominent persons were induced to attend her receptions for the sole object of meeting the great man there, and tolerated her inconceivable vulgarity and ridiculous pretensions solely on his account. It was during this time that she furnished a part of the funds that enabled Henri de Rochefort and his fellow convicts to escape to Naumea. When Gambetta became President of the Budget Committee Mme. Adam gave it to be understood that she was the Egna of the great man; whose favor could only be reached through her. For a time she was omnipotent, and her salons were crowded with Government officials who desired advancement, with officers who wanted decorations, and with brokers requiring contracts and hints for the Bourse. At last Gambetta's eyes opened to the disgraceful manner in which she made use of his friendship and he declined to have anything more to do with her whatever.

Sedgwick in Mexico.

There is no longer any doubt that Sedgwick went on a regular old time bender in Mexico. It was simply a drunken orgie in a brothel in which he so far forgot his mission and his office to disgrace both and make his country a laughing stock, to the Republic of Mexico.

The telegraphic accounts state that his debauch was carried on in a house kept by four American women known as "The Four Minnies" where toasts were proposed in the Spanish language carrying the most indecent and insulting allusions to the United States Government, to all of which he drank heartily and shouted his approval. American representatives abroad have occasionally fallen by the roadside but none have been so emphatically carried down the bank as this poor unfortunate, weak minded Sedgwick whose report upon the Cutting affair will be simply worthless.

Advantages of Alfalfa.

A Fort Collins correspondent gives as an apt illustration going to prove the value of alfalfa as a reviver of the soil, aside from its virtue as a forage plant, a fact furnished on the farm of James Culbertson. After nearly exhausting the soil by annual grain cropping, he put a portion of his farm in alfalfa, four years ago. The other day the wheat from five and one half acres was threshed, and the yield found to be forty eight bushels per acre, besides twelve bushels of alfalfa seed from plants which sprung up again after plowing.
