STOPPING THE PRESS.

How a Certain Editor Was Cured of It.

A certain editor of a weekly newspaper made a practice of "stopping the press to announce" if he had nothing more important to notice than a dog fight. One week everything was as dull as a patent office report, but the ruling passion cropped out as follows: "We stop the press to announce that nothing has occurred since we went to press of sufficient interest to induce us to stop the press to announce it."-Texas Sifting.

This brings up an incident of days gone by. When the writer used to work on the Nebraska City News the paper went to press in the afternoon. It was an old Ben Franklin hand press, and a red headed compositor named Potts jerked the lever.

It was always the custom of the writer to start out and rustle for items about the time the paper went to press. If he didn't find any the running off of the paper was allowed to go on. In case an item was picked up the reporter would climb the old rickety stairs, yelling "Stop the press, stop the press," at every jump.

The instant the command was given all work was suspended in the office and the red headed compositor named Potts would lean up against the composing stone with one hand on his hip, motionless.

But after a year or two the writer was offered a position on the St. Louis Republican to rustle up river and steamboat items.

The Republican was a morning paper, and one morning about 3 o'clock, this scribe (Lord! how our head throbs as we call it to mind) heard that the steamer Wicks was aground somewhere down below sand bar No. 684.

He rushed down into the press room under the temporary impression that he was in the old Nebraska City News office, yelling in tones of authority, "Stop that press."

Getting into the room he found the press still in action and called out again, "Blast you, stop that press."

It was a ten cylinder press, and took up more room than the present APPEAL office.

It was whirling off a continuous stream of papers from all its ten cylinders, and a seventy-five horse engine drove it on.

The reporter thought that perhaps in the midst of so much noise the head pressman did not hear the order, so we went up and yelled it in his ear, shaking the item in the other hand, savagely. The pressman looked round a moment, seemed to hear the order and recognize its import. At least, he got some idea of something, for reaching out his brawny right arm he grabbed a twelve-pound monkey wrench. Here the reporter thought that he was about to stop the press with the big monkey wrench. But he didn't think so long. The pressman simply dealt the Nebraska reporter a side winder with the wrench, just above the ear, and it knocked him senseless.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

The Financial Chronicle, which has not been regarded as a friend to silver, now says that since silver demonetization has become so complete every body sees that the white metal suffers simply because it has been discarded as currency, not in form by all European nations as by Germany, but substantially so, no one coining it and every one seeking some method to get rid of it.

The World says: India is being filled up with silver by holding out the promise of the United States becoming a dumping ground, and in a measure sustaining prices. In regard to an advance towards an international agreement, close the door here for the time being and all civilized nations will meet on something like common ground and will alike feel the advisability of action. England, and especially her principal dependency India, saturated with silver, cannot afford to let that metal go by the board any more than we can. France also has an immense amount of silver to care for. It is to the distinct advantage of the friends of silver in the United States to suspend coinage at the first opportunity in order to bring about its renewed use as money the world over, thus increasing a demand which always increases values.

SHOWING UP SEDGWICK.

A dispatch from the City of Mexico dated the 11 says: The largest meeting of the American Colony ever had in this city was attended yesterday afternoon at Odd Fellows Hall, fully two hundred being present. Resolutions were adopted regretting the resignation of Minister Jackson, and endorsing him in the highest terms. Among the resolutions was the following:

Resolved, That this meeting endorses the telegram sent August 30th, by the Consul General Porch to Secretary Bayard, as stating correctly the facts of the Sedgwick scandal.

Speeches were made by prominent American residents and transients, handling the United States State Department without gloves for protecting Sedgwick. Also that it served the Americans right for trying to shield Sedgwick, and that Sedgwick or his friends had taken advantage of the leniency in trying to shield Sedgwick at the expense of Minister Jackson.

Mushroom Newspapers.

When the Anti Chinese agitation was at its height in San Francisco a paper called the Boycoster started up. Now the Federated Trades realizes that it amounts to very little as an organ, and Agitation Board have appointed a committee to secure estimates on a first class paper to supplant it. In a case of this kind it will not do to intrust the editorial management of the paper to the first crank who professes his services. Organs of that kind cannot be maintained simply upon some temporary excitement. They must go into the business the same as regular newspapers, learn that excitement and enthusiasm does not constitute capital nor will it cause any body to patronize poor papers.
