TREAT YOUR RIVAL FAIRLY.

The rival candidates for office have already begun to kill each other off by circulating stories prejudicial to the character and fitness of their opponents. This method of electioneering for nomination is wrong, and more injurious to the candidate resorting to it than to the candidate asspersed. It is reasonable to expect that, in this county especially, where a nomination is not equivalent to an election, but that rivalry will exist, and most strenuous exertions will be made to secure a nomination. But candidates and their friends in their zeal to secure a much coveted prize, should not lose sight of the fact that contests for places are not confined to the Republican family, and should be conducted in a spirit of friendly rivalry; and that nothing should be said or done that would bring shame or reproach to either the victor or the vanquished. —Eiko Post.

ANOTHER FRAUD.

In his old age Neal Dow is also developing into a first class fraud. In the late campaign in Maine he wrote to the Boston Globe that the Republican party in Maine "has ignored the liquor law" had "persistently refused to pass legislation to suppress the liquor traffic." But not three months ago he wrote to the Temperance Alliance of England that "the Maine law, administered by the Republican party has driven every brewery and distillery from the State, has stopped nineteen-twentieth of the liquor traffic and has added \$10,000,000 annually to the wealth of the State." If Mr. Dow was a drinking man he might appeal from Dow drunk to Dow sober, or vice versa. As he is not, it looks as though he lied. By the way, the trick which was so successful against Blaine in 1884, of hiring some temperance-shouting loafers to draw votes from him did not seem to work well among the Maine men this year. —Salt Lake Tribune.

As though it was the least concern to a laboring man, a merchant, an artisan, a school teacher, a lawyer or an editor whether either Mr. Haggis or Mr. Baldwin lost or won a horse-race. A few seem to regard a victory by a California horse at the East as a credit to the whole State, in which each citizen is entitled to share as one in a million. 


