ADAMS IN STOREY.

How Democrats Regard his Candidacy.

While the writer was in Virginia City on Saturday, he talked with a good many people regarding the feeling in Storey relative to the candidacy of Jewett Adams.

The miners are almost unanimous for him, although many Cornish miners say that they have always fared best with the Republican party, and will still stick to it. There are plenty of old line Democrats, however, who are open in their opposition of Adams. One of them presented the following logical reasons for not supporting him:

"I am an old Democrat, and have for years gone to the primaries and accepted the result, supporting the regular ticket whether my side won or lost. The primary pledge I consider binding. This pledge, however," he continued, taking it out of his pocket, "does not require anyone voting to support the Democratic ticket. Adams came up here and fixed up the pledge. It binds the voter to nothing, and the word 'Democratic' does not appear in the pledge at all. The scheme was fixed up to enable Republicans to go to the primaries and vote with a clear conscience. If such a pledge is not sufficiently binding to keep Republican voters away from our primaries it is not sufficiently binding to keep men from voting the Republican ticket as far as the Governor is concerned, or any other State officer for that matter. I look upon the whole thing as a piece of political chicanery to force a man on the Democratic party, who was obnoxious to a majority of the Democrats throughout the State. Of course I do not blame the miners for their attitude toward him. He stood in with them, and it is natural that they should reciprocate. They do not seem to realize that he only acted to get their votes, and many of them say that they do not care what his motive was; he stood where they wanted him.

"Had the primary pledge bound me to vote the Democratic ticket I should have stood by the result. But it did not. Adams fixed up the pledge, and if it is not the right kind of a pledge to hold Democratic voters to vote for him in the general election it is his fault; not mine.

"Had he had a regular old fashioned Democratic pledge that would not have allowed Republicans to come in he would have lost nine delegates and been beaten at Elko. He slipped through one hole by the skin of his teeth, but he will not slide through the next."

Another Democrat took a legal view of the matter; he said:

"I consider under ordinary circumstances that when I vote at a Democratic primary I am bound in honor to stand by the result, but in this case the primary was carried by fraud which no one will deny. It is a well settled legal proposition that 'fraud vitiates all contracts,' and I stand firm on this point. It was a clean cut fraud and I do not feel bound to stand by any result brought about by fraud. I shall not vote for Adams in November, and I know whole rafts of Democrats who will not. He has traded off the Democratic party for himself for the last time."

The Crow Trial.

The trial of young Crow, charged with the killing of Hogan, began yesterday morning before Judge Edwards. His father was seated along side of him.

Clarke, Burns and Wellington Stewart appear for the defense, and it is said that Congressman Woodburn will appear in his behalf before the trial is over. Col. Ellis assists the prosecution.

It is proving very hard to secure a jury. Only three were accepted yesterday out of 45. The work of securing a jury will be resumed today.

For Chairman.

There is a general idea that Hon. Thomas Wren will be selected as Chairman of the Republican Convention to be held here this week. Mr. Wren has presided over several Conventions and understands thoroughly how to do it.

The Heathen Washoe.

C. R. Parsons, the real estate man, was sojourning at Lake Tahoe a few weeks ago, drinking in the pine gum scented air and trying to get fat on Tahoe trout. One day he and his friends strolled up to a little cirele of Washoe Indians who were hard at work over a game of casino. They watched the play until one of the bucks had possessed himself of all of the available assets of his companions, when rather than to let the session stop, Mr. Parsons offered to play with the Indian for ten cents a game.

"No," said the Chief, "Him only squaw's game; me play you for a dollar."

Finally a compromise was effected on the basis of two bits a game. The Indian exhibited remarkable skill, and Mr. Parsons had just made up his mind that he would have to telegraph to Sacramento for more funds, when he noticed a suspicious movement and, reaching over quickly he pulled from under the Indian's leg a big pack of extra aces which had no connection whatever with the pack in use. The red man had been counting up those aces on every deal. The crowd yelled with delight while the Indian took the exposure with a grin and stalked off into the sombre depths of the forest.-Placer Republican.

For County Commissioner.

Cole Atherton announces his candidacy for County Commissioner. Mr. Atherton has been a member of the present board for one term and the best endorsement of his record as a Commissioner can be found in the official records of Ormsby County. It is difficult to segregate one man's record as a county officer from the other two, as they have all worked in unison and never had a division on any matter of serious import.

The credit due one is due all. During Mr. Atherton's term the Poor Farm was established and in this matter he was a faithful worker. It has been a large saving to this county and will continue to be as long as the county lasts.

During the past two years the Board has been subjected to the annoying attacks of growlers and fault finders, who labor under the impression that they could run a county a good deal better than anybody else. In the face of these chronic fault-finders the Commissioners have gone ahead and the books show that they have reduced the county expenditures several thousand dollars a year and the result made plain to the taxpayers by a smaller tax levy.

Ways of Avoiding Strikes.

Many strikes may be avoided if the course just followed by the Harmony Cotton Mills at Cohoes N. Y., were generally adopted. The men wanted more pay, but the company told them that they could not afford to advance, and that they were already paying as much as mills in their line at Fall River and elsewhere. The men did not believe it, whereupon the manufacturers offered if the men would select a reliable man to travel about the mills and look up the subject of wages, to pay all his expenses and raise the wages if they were not as high as paid elsewhere. A boss weaver has been through Massachusetts and has gone back to Cohoes with the statement that the wages there are as high as any paid in the country, and that his fellow-work-men have no cause to complain.

A Cowardly Assassination.

LEMOORE, Cal., Sept. 20.-C. S. Hayes of Traver, editor of the Traver Tidings, was shot and instantly killed here last evening in the presence of Miss Lulu Smith, his intended wife. They were seated in the parlor of the residence of Dr. Lovelace, when suddenly the report of a gun was heard and young Hayes fell backwards, blood gushing from his mouth, and died almost instantly. The tracks of the murderer could be seen in the yard where he was thought to have run after firing. No motive is known for the crime.
