DIRT IN JOURNALISM.

The Index of yesterday says: "The Carson Union is becoming unclean in addition to being dull. Last evening's edition was so filled with grossly indecent epithets and similes as to be unfit for perusal by decent people. This is the inevitable result of such a warfare as that inaugurated by the Union editor. When vanquished by argument, or overwhelmed by the statement of fact, he resorts to vituperation. Experience will teach him that this course will not bring success to him or the mugwumpian cause which he has espoused."

Dirt in journalism is sometimes successful, but it must be well thrown to be effective. No writer of sense will resort to clumsy abuse of his rivals if he can get along without it. In times gone by it used to be looked upon as plucky and smart to heap filth all over an opponent. Journalism has taken a higher step since then, and a journalist who associates with gentlemen does not demean his calling by becoming a mere wordy flit-finger or windy scold. He must earn the respect of his readers by first respecting himself and his calling. A man with Brick Pomroy's depravity, without an ounce of his ability, presents but a sorry spectacle and earns nothing but the contempt and jeers of his fellow men. Such men have no regular standing in the profession, but are picked up from time to time and used as tools by persons who had rather hire the dirt-shoveling done than do it themselves. It is a sorry use to put any man to, yet there are plenty of people with little enough feeling to do it and give no thought of the fact that they have placed a man at a service so menial that he will never again be fit for anything else, when, by a more humane course they might have saved him from himself and made him of use to his fellows.

Placing a weak, vain and inexperienced man at the head of a campaign newspaper with full swing to gratify his small spite, is a wicked conspiracy. The victim excites our pity, and the conspirators are hezars to our contempt.

THE EARTHQUAKE PREDICTION.

Sam Davis of the Carson APPEAL, has gone into the prophet, seer and revelation business and announces earthquakes for the Pacific Coast during the second week in September. That week begins today, and we have our eye on Sam and the seismograph—Alta.

The earthquake that the Alta wanted took place at Cloverdale Cal. on Saturday. It was not a heavy shock but it may be counted as sufficient to keep the Alta's hands off us for awhile. The principal article published in the APPEAL relative to earthquakes following the New Zealand volcanic eruptions was published July 15th and stated that there would be earthquakes in the United States inside of sixty days. Since the event the scientists have ignored the APPEAL theory formulated before the earthquake but they built up a lot of new ones since the Charleston shocks.

The APPEAL still sticks to its original theory—a molten wave in the center of the earth caused by the falling of a fragment of the earth's crust. The fragment measuring probably many hundred square miles in extent, fell from a point under New Zealand and caused the volcanic eruption. The wave then traveled along under the earth's crust until it met its first heavy resistance at a point under Charleston, and then the reaction sent it back again.

By measuring the distance from New Zealand to Charleston the velocity of the wave is ascertained. Nothing easier than to locate the time that the reaction, like the undertow at sea, will bring it back to California, with slight shocks. In spite of the addition to the APPEAL's department of knowledge the subscription price remains at \$8 a year.
