A SERIOUS CHARGE.

Were the Records Tamped With? It has been asserted on more than one occasion since the adjournment of the last Legislature, that the bill "authorizing County Treasurers to place county funds in bank on open account under certain restrictions," was presented to Governor Adams without having been acted upon by both Houses and was approved by him with a full knowledge of that fact. Governed by the index, the printed journals of the Assembly show that the bill was first introduced in, and passed, by that body, reaching the Senate a substitute for it was there accepted. A Committee of Conference was appointed, and a brief report to the Senate shows that the Assembly receded from something connected either with the Senate or Assembly bill; but the journals fails to show either the Senate or that the Senate bill passed the Assembly. Both seem to have passed separate bills and agreed upon neither.

It is asserted that the bill approved by Governor Adams came to him properly certified by the officers of both Houses, but it is also asserted that the certification was irregular if not fraudulent, and that Governor Adams was apprised of the circumstance before attaching his signature to the bill. And it is further charged and believed that, to cure the irregularity in appearance, at least, the journals were tampered with before reaching the printer, but that the job was not done with sufficient thoroughness to make the cure complete. These are serious charges, and Governor Adams cannot afford to permit them to remain unexplained.—Enterprise.

CATTLE AND SHEEP OWNERS. Proposals for a Conference for Preserving the Range. There has been much complaint for some time past on the part of resident cattle and sheep owners of persons who own no land in the country, and who are not residents of the State, driving large flocks of sheep here from California and other places, and pasturing them on the range, utterly disregarding the conceded rights of resident owners. It is charged that this annual invasion wastes feed, as the owners of the migrating flocks herd them where they find the best feed, and move through the country like locusts, leaving devastation in their wake. To prevent it or at least remedy the evil, the Executive Committee of the Nevada Live Stock Association last week appointed a committee of conference consisting of G. W. Mapes, T. B. Riekey and A. C. Brazz, and invited the Wool Grower's Association to appoint a similar committee to meet with them to devise a remedy for the evil of which all complain.

The Irish Still for Blaine. PITTSBURG, October 13.—The Irish Nationalists of Pittsburg are indignant at the self-constituted committee of five which last Saturday presented an address to Chauncey F. Blake, the Democratic candidate for Governor, assuring him that all Irishmen who in 1884 cast their ballots for Blaine would this year cast Democratic ballots. It is said that all the Irish-Americans are again prepared to vote for Blaine, or an equally good Republican, in 1893. One leader, who recently returned from a visit in New York, asserts that 25,000 Irishmen in that State have left the Democratic party forever.
