## ANOTHER LIE NAILED.

A Plain Document that tells its Own Story.

The following document pretty effectually disposes of Mr. James E. Lyon and his little pamphlet.

"Know all men by these presents, that I, James Elias Lyon, of Racine, of the State of Wisconsin, in consideration of the sum \$50,000 to me in hand paid by William M. Stewart, of the State of Nevada, now of Washington, in the District of Columbia, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do hereby fully and forever release and discharge the said Stewart from all and every demand, claim and right of action of every description that I have or may claim to have against him, whether legal or equitable, and especially from any and all claims, demands or causes of action of every description growing out of his relation as attorney or counsel or agent for me in the litigation concerning the Emma mine, so called, and the various proceedings, negotiations, and contracts concerning or connected with said Emma mine and the property thereto belonging, and the conduct, management and disposition thereof by him, the said Stewart, in every and all respects and particulars.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal at the city of London, this 18th day of May, 1872. (Signed) [Seal.] JAMES E. LYON.

I, Joshua Nunn, Vice Consul General of the United States of America for Great Britain and Ireland, residing at London, duly commissioned, do hereby make known and certify to all whom it may concern that on the day of the date hereof before me personally appeared and came Joshua Elias Lyon, the person of that name described in and who has executed the foregoing release or instrument of writing, and then and there acknowledged the same to be his voluntary act and deed for the uses and purposes therein contained.

## CHARACTERISTIC TRICKERY.

A Silly Dodge Attempted by the Mugwumps.

Yesterday a number of Mugwumps and Democrats went about the town circulating the report that W. M. Stewart had a Chinaman sawing wood for him in front of his law office.

"He wants to shake his Chinamen in our teeth," said one man savagely, "if you don't believe he employs Chinese help just go down and see for yourself."

In a little while quite a number of people went over by the stable corner, and saw a Chinaman in front of Stewart's office, sawing wood. Presently another Chinaman joined him, and at this time some of the Anti-Chinese Leaguers knew no bounds.

The Mugwumps were particularly delighted that they had secured positive proof that Mr. Stewart was an employer of Chinese.

An APPEAL reporter however, investigated the matter and ascertained that the wood was not being sawed for Mr. Stewart at all, but was for the Land Receiver's office, occupied by Edmund James, a recent Democratic appointee of President Cleveland. Mr. James publicly denied having anything to do with it, laying it on to Mr. Witherell. Mr. Witherell, however, stated to perfectly responsible parties, that Mr. James told him to hire the Chinamen and he (James) would pay half.

Later in the afternoon Mr. Jacob Klein told the editor of the APPEAL that James told him that he had to get the Chinaman, as he had hunted the town over and could not find any man to do the work.

Mr. James is a leading member of the Anti-Chinese League, and has been a member of the Democratic Central Committee, and is now holding the position of Recorder of Public Monies, by appointment of Cleveland.

The Democrats and Mugwumps who went about circulating the report that Stewart was hiring a Chinaman, did so knowing perfectly well that the wood was being sawed for the Democratic Land Office. How they could ever expect to manufacture political capital when the disproving of the charge was so easy a matter, is a mystery to sensible people. The scheme was exploded by 2 o'clock, and the trickery and hypocrisy of the men who engineered the job was the talk of the town. Men who had proposed to vote the so-called anti-Chinese ticket, openly declared that they would wash their hands of it from this on, as they were sick of the petty tricks and boy's play the managers resorted to to catch votes.

### They Lacked the Band.

The Chronicle charges the Republican corporations of this State with bringing Chinamen here in vast numbers to assist in the building of Railroads; flumes, ditches and other public improvements. It can safely be said however that no Democratic corporations will ever want the Mongols for any such purpose, for the simple fact that we have not as yet heard of any Democrats who are at present interested in building railroads, flumes or ditches or in any other way spending a dollar to improve this State. Whenever railroads are to be built, or any large enterprises are to be undertaken, one does not look to Democrats to see these improvements engaged in.

In its blind fight against the Republican party, the Chronicle is daily calling attention to the fact that the Republicans have conducted all the great enterprises in this State. The Democrats had neither the progressiveness, public spirit, or the sand to tackle the job.
