- One County Commissioner (long term), One County Commissioner (short term), One Justice of the Peace, Carson Township, One Justice of the Peace, Empire Township, One Constable, Carson Township, One Constable, Empire Township, Two School Trustees, Carson District, Two School Trustees, Empire District, Two School Trustees, Brunswick District.

And the following proposed amendments to the Constitution: Proposed Amendment No. 1-Regarding future Amendments to the Constitution. May be submitted to the people after approval by one session of the Legislature.

Proposed Amendment No. 2-Requires one year's residence in this State, in addition to other legal qualifications to acquire the right of voting. Proposed Amendment No. 3-Provides that State School Funds may be invested in United States bonds, the bonds of this State or the bonds of other States.

Which said election will be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning and will continue until 6 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. The ballots used at said election shall be of good quality of white book paper, 10 inches long by 4 1/2 inches in width. The names thereof printed shall be in bourgeois or brevier capitals. The designation of office in breviter or nonpariel, and the form of printing shall be on the left hand margin of the ballot.

A DISQUALIFIED CRITIC.

An Old Resident's Views on an Important Subject.

EDITOR APPEAL:--I have no disposition to unfavorably criticize the public efforts of Dr. Herriek or to even express a doubt as to his sincerity toward the public. Surely it is the privilege of every citizen moved by the promptings of his conscience to raise his voice to every subject that arouses and interests the public, and just now while the public mind is employed with political subjects the Doctor is by no means an exception, but has as full and as an unaltered right as any other citizen. But the question arises just here. Is he competent to discuss all subjects that bear upon the general welfare of this community? Does he from experience understand all subjects upon which he treats? Or is he like many others by reason of experience incompetent? Doubtless Doctor Herriek is well informed in all the details of his profession and knows what effect his prescriptions will have on his patients. But does he know the injurious effect his remarks have upon the welfare of this county when they attack the present Assessor of Ormsby and the manner of taxing property? Is he familiar with the duties of the Assessor and the manner in which these duties have been performed? Without an intended offense I answer positively that he is not. And his public utterances, innocently made no doubt, have a tendency to injure the taxpayers of the county by creating an unjust prejudice against Mr. Kersey one of the most industrious and impartial Assessors this county ever had, and his defeat next Tuesday would be a serious loss to this county. I have resided a long while in this valley and have some knowledge of the duties of an Assessor, and have given my attention to the manner in which the duties of that office have been performed by the several Assessors of Ormsby, and with no desire to cast reflections upon former Assessors, I can say with candor and without hesitation, and without fear of contradiction, that Mr. Kersey's qualifications for Assessor and the impartial manner of discharging his duties as Assessor have given entire satisfaction to at least nine-tenth of the taxpayers of Ormsby county. The unjustifiable complaint made by a very few taxpayers of the county that Mr. Kersey is a favorite of the rail road and in return he favors the road is in my judgment not only ungenerous but cruel and tends to demoralize and injure the public affairs of the County.

I do not believe that any evidence can be cited where Mr. Kersey has been oppressive or improperly lenient with parties when assessing property. All taxpayers and especially heavy ones feel great interest in having an able and honest Assessor, and it is reasonable that when one is found and tried that he should become a favorite with unprejudiced taxpayers, and with light as well as with heavy payers.

A CANDID ADMISSION.

M. B. Mason Endorses Stewart's Anti-Chinese Record.

Yesterday the APPEAL published a challenge to any democrat or Mugwump to call at the APPEAL office and see with his own eyes the plain proof from the official records of the Senate that Wm. Stewart prevented the Chinese from becoming voters the same as American Citizens.

Some Questions Answered.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE APPEAL. --Some months ago you signed a solemn covenant to support the Anti-Chinese League in this county. Have you supported its principles? Have you kept the covenant? Are you still anti-Chinese in your sentiments? If so why do you so persistently support William Stewart for the U. S. Senate? If you are not too busy doing the work of the corporation in this State will you be kind enough to answer these questions?

A MEMBER OF THE LEAGUE. We have never yet seen the time when we were unwilling or unable to answer fair questions in a political campaign. We will take them in regular order: Our correspondent says:

"Some months ago you signed a covenant to support the anti-Chinese League."

We never did anything of the kind. We affixed our signature to a paper in which we agreed to employ no Chinese after April 1st, 1886. This agreement has been kept by the writer since April 1st. We have employed no Chinese in any capacity although Col. Ellis the gentleman whom the nominees of the anti-Chinese so enthusiastically support for the Senate, has persistently employed them.

"Have you supported its principles?"

So far as its political principles are concerned we have not. We did not sign any covenant to support the political principles of an organization which was to be bossed by scheming Democrats and renegade Mugwumps, under the guise of a sham labor movement.

"Have you kept the Covenant?"

From first to last, and no man in this county ever charged us openly to the contrary.

"Are you still anti-Chinese in sentiment?"

We are.

"If so, why do you so persistently support William Stewart for the U. S. Senate?"

First--Because in 1870 he defeated a scheme in the Senate to extend to the Chinese the right of suffrage after a fight of two days.

Second--Because he introduced a bill restricting coolie contracts from an indefinite period to six months, which bill, had it passed, would have so curtailed the profits of the Six Companies that they would have gone into bankruptcy and imported no more Chinese coolies to this Coast.

That bill was defeated by Democratic votes, and now anybody can import coolies bound to serve for twenty years, and there is no law in the United States to prevent them.

The editor of the APPEAL was the first man to sign this agreement in the county of Ormsby. There was no League in existence at that time.

If our anonymous correspondent will call at the office of the APPEAL we will cheerfully answer any more questions he may choose to ask us, and as we before stated and still state, that if we do not prove to his satisfaction that Wm. Stewart has done more effective anti-Chinese work than any ten men on this Coast, we will vote the Mugwump ticket straight.

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
