

Hon. S. P. Hughes, member of the Territorial Council of Idaho, who was here in the interests of annexation a few days since, asked the writer what steps had been taken to induce immigration to this State. When he was informed that none had been taken he seemed considerably surprised, and said that he wondered that the State had never reached out for more population.

"Idaho," he continued, "has never systematized the thing, but will very soon. Private firms have set forth the advantages of our soil and climate, and the Territory has filled up quite rapidly compared to the growth of population here.

"We are now about to establish a Board of Immigration to properly handle the thing. A bill will be introduced empowering the Governor to appoint three Commissioners at a small salary, of not over \$100 a month and expenses, to investigate the resources of the State, collect specimens of its ore, cereals, agricultural products, etc., where they can be seen by emigrants, and publish a pamphlet embodying general information relative to the resources of the State. These will be printed and scattered broadcast in the East. Colorado has done this, and it had a magical effect on the country. Nebraska and Kansas built themselves up this way, and Idaho, with better advantages, will be in the ring next Summer to compete with these States for its share of the immigration. Ten thousand a year spent this way is money invested at big interest.

"My theory is that not one family in ten which come West has the slightest idea where they will settle. They see an attractive description of land in this or that locality, and conclude to go there and grow up with the country.

There has been a big rush to California, but in my opinion California is no place for a man of small means, land has advanced to fabulous values, some bringing \$1,000 per acre. These figures frighten poor people and the tide is flung back from the Pacific Coast to the Territories lying between California and Oregon, and the Rocky Mountains. Here the climate is free from malarial influence by reason of its altitude, the soil is rich and cheap, there is no danger of the cyclone, and all agricultural products bring good prices. Then the climate on the stretch of country between the Sierra and Rocky range is unsurpassed and the ozone of the atmosphere is of great benefit to persons suffering with pulmonary complaints. We propose to boom Idaho with an Immigration Bureau and if you fellows don't do the same you'll get left."

THE CHRONICLE SCHEME.

Much interest is manifested in the Chronicle's proposed scheme of Legislative blackmail. Since the Chronicle has advanced the theory of compelling a candidate for U. S. Senator to pay money to the members, it might be well for the members who propose to go into the business to advertise in the Chronicle and publicly state just how much they are willing to sell their votes for. The Chronicle could publish the names just under its stock list and head it, "Blackmail Board," giving the regular afternoon and morning quotations, that the public might know just what the members considered their votes worth.

Joking aside, the feeling is that the Chronicle has made a bad blunder, and the anti-Stewart men are gnashing their teeth and cursing the stupidity of a sheet that was foolish enough to give the whole miserable scheme to the public. It has killed what ever life the scheme ever had, and placed the authors in a by no means enviable position.

A HOME LOTTERY.

People will purchase lottery tickets, and of the money thus spent in this manner by citizens of Nevada, very little returns to the State. While lottery playing may not be defended, if it cannot be stopped the State may as well derive some revenue from it. Other States are conducting lotteries and taking

money from Nevada and until there is some method formulated by which this species of gambling can be prevented in the United States, the plan of a Nevada State Lottery is worthy of favorable consideration.—Hawthorne Bulletin.


