

THUMPING REPUBLICAN TRAITORS.

The Enterprise of yesterday sounds the party slogan in no uncertain tones and strikes the strong key note as follows:

The Republican caucus, at Carson, on Sunday night, settled two things pretty effectually. It selected the officers of the two Houses and exposed the utterly baseless nature of the Powning-Wren claim that a majority of the Republican members-elect were hostile to the Republican party. There were just two Republican members absent from the caucus—and they were absent from Carson.

In order that this victory of true over spurious Republicans may be fully understood, it is necessary to state that both Mr. Wren and Mr. Powning were at the Capital, working like beavers all day to prevent a caucus, and thus delay the organization of the two Houses. The party has returned its answer. How do they like it?

As the Enterprise stated a month ago, the Powning boom was all froth. It stood stationary under the gentle buffeting of jaw-wagging zephyrs. The first lively gale that struck it scattered it to the four corners of Washoe county from whence it came.

Mr. Wren has talked less than Powning—or, at any rate, has talked less publicly. Powning had types wherewith to spread abroad the glories of his canvass. Wren was forced to depend upon the garrulousness of friends. Fame smiled more sweetly upon Powning than upon Wren, but Wren's methods, no less than Powning's, belonged to the category of vicious and unmanly acts.

Each sought to win by disgraceful means. Each tried by every art to prevent an organization of the Houses. Each sought to delay the public business to greatly unsatisfied ambition. Neither was manly enough to trust to generous rivalry. Both adopted means abhorrent to every sense of justice, and both lost the game.

In Carson last night the general feeling among Republicans was that a Senatorial caucus within a day or two was desirable. We think it is. If there are one or two Assemblymen who love party less than boodle, what boots it? Leave them out of the caucus if they don't want to enter it. There are plenty of patriotic men to choose a Republican Senator without their aid. Let us and the silly clatter of traitors. Our ears have been vexed with it so long that we feel like adopting the example of the darkey who was caught out in the woods in a storm. The thunder rolled, the lightning flashed and the darkness was awful. The darkey prayed: "Oh, Lord, please send us less noise and more light."

GOOD ADVICE.

The Silver State says: The Thirtieth Session of the Nevada Legislature convenes at Carson today. Much is expected in the way of beneficial legislation from this body, and it is greatly to be hoped that the people will not be as grievously disappointed in results as they were two years ago.

It is believed that the body as a whole is intent on doing all in its power to advance the material interests of the State, and the people expect that among the very first acts will be memorials to Congress setting forth the absolute necessity of increasing the population and taxable property of the State, by the annexation of Southern Idaho and Western Utah, and of making liberal appropriations for the boring of artesian wells and storing the waters which now run to waste in the Spring and early Summer, so as to materially increase the area of arable land.

An idea seems to prevail in the western part of the State, that steps should be taken by the Legislature to invite immigration to the State, but the advocates of the measure do not appear to have given the subject serious thought. The land laws of Nevada are the most liberal of any State in the Union, but the great trouble is, there are no lands in the State, subject to entry at the State or United States Land offices, which can be cultivated without water. Therefore it is not advisa-

ble to invite immigration until some method is devised for irrigating those lands, as a family with a few hundred dollars can not make a living on any section of unsold land within fifty miles of the railroad from the Truckee river to the Utah line. Members of the Legislature from the central and eastern part of the State understand the situation much better than those from Ormsby and Storey counties, and doubtless will enlighten the latter when the subject is brought before the Legislature.
