CARSON CITY, NEV., Jan. 14th. Senate met at 11 A. M., President in the chair.

Roll called, all present. Prayer by Rev. E. W. Van Deventer.

Journal read and approved.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Fish-Joint Resolution No. 3, relative to depositing sawdust in the Truckee River. [Memorializes California Legislature on the matter.] Referred to Com. on Federal Relations.

By Sharon-S. B. No. 26, an Act making appropriation for State University. Read and referred to Com. of the Whole.

At 12:5 P. M. Senate took recess until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Roll called, quorum present. Leave of absence granted to Senator Hardesty.

On motion Senate went into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of Senate bill No. 26, an Act making appropriation for State University. Passage recommended.

S. B. No. 24-An Act to pay the deficiencies in the appropriation for the years 1885-6. Passage recommended.

Report of the Committee of the Whole adopted and Senate adjourned at 2:10 o'clock P. M. until Monday morning.

ASSEMBLY.

House called to order at 11 A. M., Speaker McDonell in the chair. Roll called, quorum present.

Prayer by Rev. J. L. Woods. Journal read and approved.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Drury-Memorial and Joint Resolution relative to Carson Mint. (The resolution arraigns the Administration for its action in regard to the Mint, and petitions Congress, and sets forth reasons in an able manner for continuing the Mint in full operation.) Referred to Committee on Federal Relations.
