FIFTEENTH DAY.

SENATE.

CARSON CITY, NEV. Jan. 19th. Senate met at 11 A. M., President in the chair. Roll called, quorum present. Prayer by Rev. J. L. Woods. Journal read and approved. A. B. No. 15.—An Act to provide revenue for the State of Nevada. Relative to license collections by Sheriff. Referred to Ways and Means Committee. A. B. 29.—An Act relative to fees and compensations of certain officials. Referred to Judiciary Committee. A. B. 28.—Relative to appointment of janitor for Committee Rooms. Referred to Ways and Means Committee. By Powell—S. B. No. 39, relative to empanelling jurors. Referred to Judiciary Committee. By Nichols—S. B. No. 40, relative to payment of officials, indorses the salary bill of 1885. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means. MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS. By Weatherfield—Relative to transmitting certain documents to Senate by Secretary of State. Adopted. By Foley—S. B. No. 41, An Act to create a commission to prepare and report to the Legislature such amendments to the laws of the State of Nevada as are necessary to adopt and harmonize the same with the Judiciary system now in force in this State. The Commission to consist of Clarke, Lindsay and Coffin. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Adams to be trustees Bonds \$10,000, payable in ten years.] Passed. Recess till 2 P. M.

All present. A. B. No. 16, relating to marks and brands on stock. Referred to Judiciary Committee. A. B. 17—An Act to amend an Act for the maintenance of Public Schools. Referred to Committee on Education. A. B. 19—An Act to regulate the affairs of deceased persons. Referred to Judiciary Committee. A. B. 25—An Act referring to unlawfully wearing G. A. R. badges. Making it a penal offense. Referred to Committee on Military and Indian Affairs. Adjourned.

By Alt—A. B. No. 33, an Act to ratify all to the Nevada District Agricultural Society, and the District Agricultural societies of the State. (Gives \$5,000 a year to the State Society, and \$1,000 to the District societies.) Referred to Committee on Agriculture. Senate Joint Resolution and Memorial No. 4, relative to war claims of Nevada against Government. Referred to Committee on Federal Relations. Senate B. No. 24—An Act to pay deficiencies in appropriations of State Government for years 1885-6.

Made special order for this afternoon at 2 P. M.

GENERAL FILE.

A. B. No. 17—An Act to provide for the maintenance of Public Schools. (Prescribes time for changing text books. Fixes time at eight years instead of four, as the law now stands.) Passed. A. B. No. 16—Relative to marks and brands of stock. (Fixes fine and imprisonment for unlawful branding of stock.) Passed. A. B. No. 6—Providing for purchase of portrait of ex-Governor J. W. Adams. (Appropriates \$500.) Made special order for this afternoon. A. B. No. 19—Relative to estates of deceased persons. Passed. S. B. Amending Public School law. (Amends Sec. 13, fixing school districts at five census children instead of ten, as now.) Passed; yeas 29, noes 10. At 12:15 Assembly took a recess till 2 o'clock.

AFTER RECESS.

S. B. No. 24. (Deficiency appropriation bill) considered in Committee of the Whole and referred to Ways and Means Committee. A. B. No. 6, relative to purchasing portrait of ex-Governor Adams considered by same Committee and passage recommended. Assembly Joint Memorial and Resolution No. 6, relative to Carson Mint. After various amendments ordered engrossed. A. B. No. 6, relative to portrait of ex-Governor Adams, passed Governor's Inaugural taken up and referred to various Committees. By Drury—Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 11, relative to Board of Regents reporting condition of affairs in State University. Adopted. Senate Joint Res. No. 3, relative to saw dust in Truckee river. Adopted. Adjourned.
