

AN ECONOMIC FAILURE.

During the past four years the State of Nevada has had for its Prison Warden, Frank Bell, of Reno. When he appeared as a candidate his wonderful business capacity, adaptability for the place, and sterling qualities were on everybody's tongue. It soon became apparent that no such double-edged, gilt-edged candidate for the place had ever before appeared. The APPEAL mildly ventured to insinuate some inquiries relative to Mr. Bell's fitness for the place, and also lifted up its voice for an Ormsby county man who was also a candidate. All objections were swept away, and even Ormsby county members voted for the Reno man. It was not long before his policy of running the Institution on a ridiculously cheap John basis was manifested, and the APPEAL over and over again called public attention to the fact that the policy pursued by Bell would, if allowed to continue, prove the ultimate ruin of the institution. Bell's friends, however, met these charges by saying that it was "nothing but a newspaper talk," and that the editor "was prejudiced," and this method of disposing of the charges was, curiously enough, perfectly satisfactory to the Prison Commissioners.

Two years passed, and Bell, by making a wonderful showing on paper, again posed as the great Nevada economist, who could run a public institution on little or nothing and have a big surplus left for the Treasury. The APPEAL again called the attention of the State and public to his methods, his figures, his false and ruinous economies; but the Prison Commissioners still slept. The friends of Bell said it was "all a newspaper talk," and Bell held his place, still posing as the model economist of his day and generation. A third time he asked for the office, but several scores of people who now began to regard him as a humbug sent him back to Reno, and his successor was installed.

Now the economic bubble has burst, and the Commissioners find that very little except the shell of the Institution remains. The report made by Bell proves to be untrue in almost every particular, and the errors are so glaring as to make men wonder as they read. What have the Prison Commissioners of the past four years got to offer for their plain neglect of duty in allowing Mr. Bell to run a State institution into the ground and that, to, right under their noses.

The lesson to be heeded in this case is that it may at times be well to listen to the "d— newspapers," and at the same time keep a careful eye on the crank economist.

—It is safe to say, says the S. F. Post, that if through fortunate circumstances the market should become as active as it was at the close of last year, there would be very few, if any failures, among the brokers, because affairs among them are believed to be in a very sound condition. Transactions are now conducted in Reno on a cash basis, and the bulk of the stocks are said to be in the possession of the actual and rightful owners.
