A Wine Breakfast.
The Call of the 2nd has the following:
As a compliment to the officers and prominent men engaged in behalf of progress in California viticulture Adolph Sutro, at the close of the Winegrowers' Convention, extended to the officers of the Convention, the State Commission and certain prominent viticulturists an invitation to breakfast with him at Sutro Heights.

The feature of the breakfast, which was prolonged for four hours, was the presentation for study and enjoyment of a long list of the grandest vintages of the world, intended more as models to incite emulation than for comparison with California's younger growths, although to enable the study to be more instructive samples of California wines were placed by their side. NEVADA WATER LAW.

A Communication from Judge Wells on the Subject.
CARSON CITY March 16th, 1887
EDITOR MORNING APPEAL: Under the caption, "The Doom of Riparianism" you publish an editorial in your issue of the 15th instant, which, though not intended so to do, does injustice to our worthy Supreme Court. And as you and I had some conversation on that subject, on Monday last, what I then said may have had a tendency to mislead you, as I was not then aware of that Court's opinion in the case of Jones vs. Adams, filed April 1, 1885. In this case the third and fifth "Findings of Fact." in the Lower Court were as follows: "3d, That the plaintiff, Joseph Jones, is the owner of a usufruct in the waters of said stream, and that he and his grantors first appropriated and used, and that he is the owner, by right of appropriation and use, of seven tenths part of all the water customarily flowing in said stream; that the plaintiff, Jos. Jones, is entitled to, use, as the first appropriator, upon the said land, upon each and every part thereof, seven tenths of all the waters customarily flowing in said Sierra Creek, and is entitled to divert the said water from the said stream upon his said land by means of flumes, ditches or otherwise; and to use the same upon his said land for the irrigation thereof, and to use so much of the said seven tenths of said stream, as is necessary for his stock and domestic purposes."

2. Adams is the owner of a usufruct in the waters of said stream, and that he and his grantors in the year 1860 appropriated and used, and that he is the owner by right of appropriation and use, of three tenths part of all the water customarily flowing in said stream; and that said defendant is entitled to use, as the first appropriator, upon his said land, and upon such and every part thereof, three tenths of all the water customarily flowing in Sierra Creek, and is entitled to divert the said water from said stream upon said land by means of flumes, ditches or otherwise; and to use so much of the said three tenths part of said stream, as is necessary for his stock and domestic purposes."

The judgement in the above case was for the defendant, in the Court below, and was affirmed by the Supreme Court on appeal. The action was prosecuted by the plaintiff to maintain riparian proprietorship, and its incidental right to the water, and invoked the doctrine of Van Sickle vs. Haines, (7 Nev., 249) as decisive of his rights.

In concluding the opinion, and affirming the judgement, the Supreme Court said: "It necessarily follows from the views we have expressed, and from the doctrines announced in the authorities we have cited, that the Court (below) did not err in rendering its judgement and decree upon the findings in relation to prior appropriation. The case of Van Sickle vs. Haines, in so far as the same is in conflict with the views herein expressed, is hereby overruled. The judgement of the District Court is affirmed."

The printed opinion is in Hon. Chas. F. Bicknell's office scrapbook, but not yet in volume.

I am glad to say that, the case of Van Sickle vs. Haines is over-ruled by that of Jones vs. Adams, as to riparian rights; and that our entire Supreme Court has aided in "The Doom of Riparianism," in Sage-land.

SOME BIG ARTESIAN WELLS.

An Opportunity which Nevada Refused to Grasp.
The Chronicle says: Various attempts are in progress to get from artesian wells not only water but power and heat as well. Machinery is already driven by the pressure, in France, and experience shows that the heat may be increased by adding to the depth of the well. At Grenelle a well 1,802 feet deep, and yielding daily 500,000 gallons, has a pressure of sixty pounds to the square inch, and the water is so hot that it is employed for heating hospitals in the vicinity. The deepest well in the world is being sunk in Pesh, Hungary, to supply hot water for public baths. It now yields daily 176,000 gallons heated to 158 degrees, and the boring is to be continued until the temperature is raised to 176 degrees."
During the last season a well was introduced to test the artesian resources of Nevada by sinking a well at the State Prison 5,000 feet deep, by convict labor. Mr. Pike, of Churchill, denounced it as "a job," and of course so eminent an authority as that was at once listened to. A well 5,000 feet deep sunk at the State Prison would have been watched with interest by the scientific world, as the spot is the most promising in America for the study of the geological formations which have caused scientists all over the world to visit Carson that they might personally inspect the discoveries recently made there.

In all probability a well 1,000 feet deep at the Prison would give to the city of Carson enough hot water to supply every house with it and irrigate every garden here. There is no telling what a 5,000-foot well might not furnish us, and with convict labor to do the work the cost would not be great. The obstructionists, however, and the Salurians, defeated the bill.

The sinking of that well would demonstrate beyond a doubt what every one wants to see demonstrated in this State, and that is, whether or not artesian water in paying quantities can be found at given depths.

THE PRISON MULE.

Does He, Like You, Improve With Age

Considerable discussion is now going on at the State Prison over the mule which locomotes the dump cart. Various theories are advanced as to the mule's age. He has been a fixture at the prison ever since the place was built. Bell puts him down on his inventory as valued at \$125. The question now arises, does a mule improve in value, with age, like wine?

The experts on ages of animals have all taken a look at the mule's mouth and all agree that the molar remnants now in file in that old hay cavern, are no longer reliable guides to the animal's years. McInnis of Reno sets down his age as contemporaneous with the pre-historic tracks, but Pat Corbett thinks that he anti-dates all the tracks.

The more accepted theory is that Bell in placing him on the inventory figured up his age and concluded that he was worth a dollar a year.

OR. FINANCE No. 73.

AN ORDINANCE TO ABOLISH Opium Smoking dens and to prohibit the keeping of pieces of resort for smoking.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City, do ordain:
Section 1. No person or persons shall within the limits of Carson City, keep or maintain or become an inmate of or visit or contribute to the support of any place, house or room, where persons frequent or assemble for the purpose of smoking opium, or resort to any such house, place or room for the purpose of indulging in the use of opium, or any preparation containing opium, by smoking or otherwise, and the Court, pronouncing a judgment of conviction under this Ordinance shall declare such opium and pipes contraband and unlawful, and shall direct and order that all opium and pipes and utensils used in smoking opium, taken or found, be destroyed by the officer or person having the possession thereof, as soon as the same is no longer necessary for the purposes of evidence.

Section 2.-Any person who shall violate any of the provision of Section 1 of this Ordinance, shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding Two Hundred dollars or imprisonment not more than 100 days or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

Section 3.-All Ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed and particularly ordinance No. 48 is hereby repealed.
