NO BOOM FOR NEVADA.

Every day for the past six months long trains of people have been passing through this State bound for California. There is a boom in California, and it is growing in proportions steadily.

It is not for us to say whether or not the boom will be a permanent one. The proof of the pudding is in the eating, and as long as people flock to a country and pay \$500 an acre for land and esteem it a privilege to do it, any remarks against this proceeding from a neighboring State will be apt to raise the cry of "sour grapes."

California is reaping the reward of its public spirit, and we are glad of it.

The California boom started from the excellent work of the press, which advertised its resources to the world.

When a Los Angeles paper contains a glowing account of the orange groves, with some illustrations of the public improvements, the public-spirited City Council calls a meeting and appropriates \$300 or \$500 to the paper, and tells it to get out an extra edition and scatter it broadcast over the earth. No old foggy howls about robbing the Treasury, or no spiteful, narrow-minded fool throws obstructions in the way, or charges that there is a ring helping the paper swindle the taxpayers.

In Santa Barbara, in Sacramento, in San Jose and a dozen other towns, this same policy has been observed, and millions of newspapers containing illustrations and glowing descriptions of the country have gone abroad over the habitable earth, to proclaim in trumpet blasts the resources and advantages of California. This was done at the expense of the public and taxpayers, and not one of them ever growled.

This sort of enterprise soon bore fruit. The carrying capacity of three railroads is not today enough to accommodate the immigration as fast as it would like to come.

In these towns the hotels are packed almost as full as when the Grand Army Encampment was in San Francisco.

Mechanics and artisans are working night and day to put up houses, and when the day shift has gone to bed another gang comes on and works by the electric light. Every class of business is making money hand over fist, the streets are crowded with people, the banks are bursting with deposits, the theaters have the legend "Standing room only" at the door, and the bustle and confusion of business makes the earth tremble.

Nothing of this kind, however, is going on in Nevada. The old shell back Silurians are holding this State with a death grip. Everything that smacks of the nature of enterprise or progress is opposed. They jump on the stomach and kick in the ribs of every scheme that they themselves cannot inaugurate, boss and make the money out of. They fight all public expenditures, talk dolefully of hard times and taxes, charge enormous rents, and allow their buildings to remain closed, loan money at 2 per cent., and never contribute a dollar to any public enterprise from the fear that if the enterprise were a success their neighbor would make another dollar.

Some of these men who tell you that the country is going to the dogs will the next day ask you four prices for a corner lot if you want to purchase and build, and then let that lot lie idle ten years before they will come down a cent. There is no boom up here, and there will not be until these old moss covered impediments die and are buried in the productive soil that they effect to despise.

Fruit raised here can be shipped five times the distance that the owners of California fruit ever dare to ship, and be in better condition. We assert that a palatable potatoe cannot today be raised in California, and the very potatoes eaten every morning at the San Francisco hotels, over which the tourists go into ecstasies, are raised in Nevada and attributed to California.

Before long the men who are be-

ing drawn into the Southern California net will be coming back in disgust and looking for a country where there are no hot nights, no malaria, no 120 in the shade, and where fruits and vegetables are allowed proper time to mature, and are not one-third water when ready to eat.

Nevada, with its high, dry climate, its strong soil, its freedom from the diseases incidental to the lower hot altitudes, will be the place for these people who have tried Southern California and gotten disappointed with it.

There is nothing, however, to guide them here, no immigration society, and no pamphlets to scatter on the train. All they will know about the State is that its Legislature killed all the State development, artesian well and irrigation bills that were worth anything, and they will naturally go through without investigating.
