

NEVADA'S FUTURE.

The Senator in the meantime is prospecting among the hills of that county for silver, etc." or "The editor of the Bladder, from Mud Lake, Nevada, Mr. Reed, is stopping at the Palace.

In the name of all that is reasonable we ask of what material benefit is all this balderdash to the future of our State? Every industry, every enterprise our people are engaged in, from the development of a gold or silver mine to the cultivation of some of the finest ranches in the world, to the raising of the most excellent stock and fattened cattle ever sent to market, are never mentioned by these taffy slingers. Not a single idea is promulgated through them calculated to attract the attention of capital to the undeveloped fields of our commonwealth. Nevertheless they all look forward for Nevada's \$20 gold pieces. The coffers of the thrifty enterprising California merchant, hotel proprietor, banker, stock broker and mining shlyock are hourly replenished by the constant contribution of our citizens. The press is content to acknowledge (sop-like) the arrival of such distinguished personages as we have mentioned above. Nary a word is said of the future possibilities of Reno, Carson or Virginia City, the extent of our railroad enterprises, the Reduction Works, our unequalled water power, mineral resources, cattle ranges, and last but not least, our wonderful—not glorious climate and superb stock. To these must be added the fact that the most luscious apples and the finest potatoes in the world can be found every day in the year in our market. On the whole our agricultural advantages are never mentioned and our educational facilities are entirely overlooked. As a State we owe not a penny to the world. Here in Nevada every nationality can find accommodation in an educational direction.

How to appropriate it should be the aim of every true citizen, and that aim should be to build up such true industries as will attract on merit alone, and then we predict a future for Nevada, which can only be unrivaled by San Francisco itself.
