NATURAL GAS.

A Big Boom in Paradise Valley.

PARADISE, May 2, 1887.

EDITOR SILVER STATE:—Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Pasadena, San Luis Obispo, and many other places in California are having their boom. It is about time for Nevada to come to the front in her usual grand style. Humboldt will soon have the biggest boom out, Senator Pierce believes the upper part of Paradise Valley lies in the greatest gas belt in the world. He has been boring for water, and struck a gas well that he believes will flow 7,000,000 feet in 24 hours. He has named it "Eureka." The excitement here is great, and there are several capitalists who intend to take stock in the well, and it is probable many others will soon be bored. Our citizens are willing to build a gas belt around the entire town, so as to induce manufacturers to locate here and have the benefit of free gas. I understand he intends to pipe gas from here to Winnemucca, and believes he can make a good thing out of it. Our citizens held a meeting today and decided to lay a pipe to Paradise. We will soon have natural gas burning in the town.

Bell & Soper, the active, live and enterprising young merchants of Spring City, attended the meeting today, and contracted for the natural thing to burn in their store, and Bell wants it in all his many houses in Spring City.

Hurrah for Paradise! An enterprising citizen of our town intends to erect water-works immediately, and you can put it down as a fixed fact that Paradise instead of being one of the handsomest towns in the State, will soon be the most beautiful and attractive commercially.

Humboldt's Bullion Product.

The assessment roll of the proceeds of mines in Humboldt county for the quarter year ended March 31, 1887, shows that the Paradise Valley Mining Company reduced 1,400 tons, the gross yield of which was \$55,827 88, and the net yield \$12,284 17, the tax on which amounts to \$334 37. The Ross M. & M. Co., reduced in the same time 1,331 tons, the gross yield of which was \$7,218 36 in gold, and the cost of production \$8,293 46.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

—Frank Daniels was badly gored by a bull on White's Holstein ranch near La Reveille, Sonoma county, Tuesday.

—The carpenters at Santa Barbara are on a strike for nine hours. The contractors refuse to pay for a full day's work for nine hours.

—The schooner Active, heretofore reported several times as having been lost, with all hands, has been heard from off Queen Charlotte's Island.

—Callahan, who called a neighbor to his door at San Bernardino and then shot him down, has been convicted of murder and will have a life sentence.

—The last spike in the California Central Line between Los Angeles and San Bernardino was driven at noon Tuesday at Azusa. It will be a week or more before regular trains are run, as there are no depots, agents, or sufficient rolling stock.

—Tuesday at Portland Or., a trio of burglars, John Kelly, Edward Wilson and Thomas Ruthford, received sentences for grand larceny and burglary. Ten days ago they committed a robbery. Monday they were arrested pleaded guilty and were sentenced.
