

A WELL-DESERVED REBUKE.

Last week, in San Francisco, Col. Flourney administered a rebuke to one, Wilson, a lawyer who was trying a Chinese case with him. The Colonel intimated pretty strongly that a lawyer who would assist Chinese procurers in capturing and retaining Chinese women for the purpose of prostitution was a man who would stoop to almost anything. Yet Wilson belongs to the Bar Association of San Francisco, stands well in the profession, goes in good society, and is recognized as a gentleman.

It is odd, but nevertheless true, that a man can put in his time all day assisting for hire, a dirty gang of Chinese pimps in obtaining possession of a levitating harlot, and attend a reception in the evening and mingle with the best people of the city. This is indeed a curious state of affairs. Now suppose a journalist were to sell the columns of his paper to the furtherance of this nefarious traffic; he would at once be tabooed by decent men, and looked upon as a villain of the deepest dye. Time from Mount Hamilton.

The time by which the railroad clocks at San Francisco and Oakland wharf are regulated is obtained daily from the Lick Observatory at Mount Hamilton, and every two or three days it is telegraphed to Sacramento, where the chronometer is kept by which men in the Southern Pacific employ, above the East of Sacramento, regulate their watches and clocks daily, as the operators strike 12 M over the wires. But the railroad company is preparing for an improvement in forwarding time. Apparatus is being constructed by which a telegraph wire will be connected with the pendulum of the clock at the Lick Observatory. At one minute to 12 the wires will be opened, all other business suspended, and at 12 the hour will be struck in every railroad office from El Paso to Ogden and throughout California.
