ANOTHER LINE THROUGH NEVADA.

The Mistakes of Eastern People regarding This State.

The Chicago Commercial Advertiser, an authority on railroad matters has an entire page given to a map of the new trans-continental route through Nevada. It will be an extension of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy. In connection with the map it prints the following:

There is one *terra incognita* still remaining in America for railway penetration and that is the valley or basin of the Rocky mountains, covering a great part of Nevada and Southern Utah. We present on this page a map of this locality, also the proposed new line of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy from Denver to San Francisco. This new route leaves the Denver and Rio Grande at Green River and winding along the valleys among the mountains crosses a broad stretch of country of which but little is known. It is said to be rich in minerals, but to be of an unpleasant climate and much of the surface of the land is mixed with alkali as to be unproductive.

It will be remembered that all that was wanted in Kansas and Colorado, Nebraska and Dakota was the presence of settlers, the digging of the soil and the presence of railways to bring frequent rains and it is more than probable that this Nevada basin only wants the presence of the plow.

The idea of Nevada being "an unpleasant climate" shows how little the Eastern people know of us. As for the soil being mixed with alkali, this is another absurdity, as it is the richest and strongest soil in the United States today. We have alkali flats here, but when this alkali is worked out by irrigation it leaves a soil always rich and moist, in which the finest of crops can be raised. Scientific farming really makes this alkali soil the most desirable of all soils.

Ought to be Encouraged.

The old trick of putting the biggest and best fruit on the top of the box is becoming a sort of a chestnut. The Newcastle fruit company have made a radical departure from this old thread-bare swindle and are sending boxes of strawberries to this city with berries as firm and large in the bottom of the box as at the top. The writer's attention was first called to this matter yesterday in purchasing some berries of Job Sternberg, where the boxes were filled with berries of uniform size throughout. They came from the Newcastle Fruit Company and this item is printed to let the public know that there is at least one California fruit company who does not send its refuse fruit to this State in the bottom of boxes with the good fruit on top as a blind.

The Newcastle strawberry boxes have no tin on the top. Call for the Newcastle fruit. Newcastle is nearer Nevada than any fruit shipping point and fruit from Newcastle reaches here in a few hours fresh and firm.

A New strike.

Woods & Coffin have made a most profitable find in their claim in the vicinity of the Norrie & Kirman mine, on the Western slope of Mt. Davidson. They have struck a rich vein of gold bearing rock that assays in general, and not in the average, \$1,300 per ton. How long it shall last is unknown, but while it does last the boys have a sure road to fortune.

While many unbelievers may bery the Norrie divining-rod, every one at any rate must acknowledge that it has been the means of reopening a field of mining inquiry, too long abandoned during the excitement of bonanza, and latter days of despondency.
