CAGING THE MAN-EATER.

Mike McGowan Tries to Devour Officer Furlong.

About 1 o'clock yesterday morning, McGowan, commonly called the "man-eater," from a disposition he has of trying to eat people—was in Sweeney's saloon as the bar-keeper was about closing up. He was ordered to leave, but declined, saying that the surroundings of the place suited him. The bar-keeper, who knew of his great masticating powers, did not feel like trying conclusions with him, and accordingly sent for officer Furlong. Furlong ordered him out, whereupon he remarked that no officer that lived could put him out. The officer opened the ball by grabbing his man by the collar, and there was a lively fracas. They rolled over the floor a while and upset the furniture, when the man-eater began to make his midnight lunch off Furlong, who at once began to use his cane. He wore a hickory club out on McGowan; and then dragged him to the lock-up. McGowan still lies in jail recovering from the effects of his spree and his fracas. He was liberated from the State Prison the day before, and solemnly promised the Warden that he would never take another drink while he lived.

Dan Lyons and the Queen.

Some years ago Dan Lyons, well remembered in this State as an honest member of the Legislature and manager of the Virginia Chronicle, moved to the Sandwich Islands and there started a newspaper. Everybody who ever knew Dan in Nevada wished him prosperity. Of course Dan being an Irishman was immediately "forermost the government" and his paper soon turned its batteries against the Kalakua regime and he used to bang it at the royal family in great shape. From a New York dispatch it is quite evident that Dan's paper has become a power in the land; as the dispatch says that a few days ago the Queen received a copy of it in New York and on reading a prediction that the royal family of the Islands was on its last legs and that the whole dynasty was soon to be snuffed out, she shed tears.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

—Swarms of blackbirds are depredating the San Luis Obispo grain-fields.

—The Meader House at Copperopolis was burned Saturday night. Loss, about \$6,000.

—A large sperm whale stranded near the mouth of San Vicenti, creek twelve miles below Santa Cruz, Saturday.

—Considerable credence is given to a report at Los Angeles that Jay Gould has purchased Rattlesnake Island at San Pedro.

—An employe of a Port Discovery, W. T., mill was recently awarded \$12,000 damages by the courts for the loss of an arm while running a scantling machine.

—A large portion of the bridge across Columbia slough, between Portland, Or., and Vancouver, fell yesterday. The bridge is a mile and a half long and about one quarter down.

—The communistic colony at Port Angeles, on Puget Sound, now numbers 150 persons. They own 2,000 acres of land and expect to build and operate a saw-mill soon. They profess no religious creed.

—Edward B. Freese, the son of Pilot Commissioner Freese, was run over by an East-bound freight train near Summit Station, on the Central Pacific, Monday morning and was taken to San Francisco, where amputation of a leg will be performed. The foot on the other limb was badly crushed.

Shower.

A delightful shower struck Carson yesterday about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. It came from a single cloud just about the size of the town. The sun was shining brightly and the rain was confined to the regular municipal limits.

RAILROADS.

They are All Consolidated Into the S. P. C. R. R. Co.

Articles of "incorporation, amalgamation and consolidation" of the following railroad companies were filed to-day. Santa Cruz & Felton Railroad, South Pacific Coast Railroad, Bay and Coast Railroad, Oakland Township Railroad, San Francisco & Colorado River Railroad, Felton & Pescadero Railroad and Alameda Branch Railroad. The articles set forth that the directors and holders of issued stock have agreed to the "consolidation and amalgamation," of their capital stock, depots, property, assets and franchises and that the name of the new corporation shall be the South Pacific Coast Railway Company. The length of the railroad and its branches is one hundred and thirty six miles, and the contemplated length is seven hundred and fifty miles. The capital stock is \$60,000,000 divided into 60,000 shares of \$100, one share of which goes to the stockholders, for each share originally held by them. Of the issued stock James G. Fair owns 44,934 shares. The Directors are: James G. Fair, President; E. J. Coalman, E. S. Pillsbury, W. G. Cohen, New York; Chas. E. Stewart, V. G. Gaskill and L. B. Benchley.
