

ABOLISH PLATFORMS.

San Francisco Alta: "General Logan once uttered some homely common sense when he said the Republican party was too strong to be broken by anything 'except the admission of fool things into its platforms.' Next year 'fool things' will swarm around platforms like yellow jackets around a meadows bung."

It would seem that the time had about come to abolish that masquerading known as a party platform. It is a flimsy, lying, hypocritical affair, and after once formulated, read and approved, is ordered printed in a newspaper, and never read by anybody except the editors of opposition newspapers, some of whom are crazy enough to think that they can influence votes by picking the platform to pieces.

Again, when some ignorant and dishonest man is up for office and some one objects to his competency, his friends pull out the platform and say: "He may not be the best, but these are the principles he represents."

This play usually gets the old fraud a vote. The farce of compelling each candidate to walk up and endorse the platform "from top to bottom," is an insult to the intelligence of a convention when in nine cases out of ten the man who, with uplifted hand endorses the platform, did not hear it presented, but was out rustling and connubiating when the long-winded, dreary document was read, and to save his neck could not repeat a single plank of it.

The old political rusty, crusty, moth-masticated plotitudes that have bobbed up for a century are always found swarming on the platform of every political convention.

Did a single man ever omit to say, "And the party (Rep. or Dem. as the case may be) points with pride" at the so and so and so and so? At which some old fossil sent down the party hillside by the alluvial wash of years, begins to pound the floor with his cane, and the balance of the gang wake up and stamp and yell.

Go to any man in the State Capitol building and ask him if he can repeat an outline of the last Republican platform, and dollars to Cassidy's doughnuts he can't repeat a single plank, and there never was an official who could since the days of the Revolution.

The party puts up a platform as has before been said, "to catch votes," but the foolishness of the proceeding becomes more marked when one reflects that they never catch any.

They promise all sorts of absurd things on the tariff, and invariably promise great things to the "laboring man," and inside a week half the members of the convention are jewing down their hired help, and the candidates are figuring how cheap they can get people to work for them.

The party platform is a hollow farce and sounding fraud, and every time you hit the bloated thing it gives forth a sound like a flabbergasted bass drum on a rainy day.

Because Mr. Blaine is an ardent sympathizer with Irish aspirations he has been accused of trucking to the Irish vote. To those who have this opinion, his unhesitating refusal to make his visit to England the occasion of a stumping tour in favor of home rule will be inexplicable. Mr. Blaine rightly says that any action of the kind would be meddling with the affairs of another nation, and would be as offensive as for a prominent Englishman to take the stamp in one of our National campaigns. It is well enough to remember that sympathy with a worthy cause does not annul the obligations of good taste and common sense. Mr. Blaine is a friend of Ireland, and also a gentleman, and his known opinions will do home rule more good than could be gained by an uncalled for obtrusion of them.—Post.
