THE EARTHQUAKE.

A VULGAR BUSINESS BASIS.

The Reno Gazette says: "The most moving disclosures as to the dire effects of the inter-State Commerce law comes from Ohio. There it is alleged the area of reciprocal good feeling, amicable sentiments and general amity existing between public officials and the railroad corporations has been wholly destroyed by the abolition of passes.

"It is alleged that since the passes of county auditors have been cut off, those officers have conceived the remarkable idea that railroad property is worth as much as any other real estate. The corporations are on the verge of having to pay full rates of taxation; and the whole business of assessment and payment of taxes is on the brink of being reduced to a vulgar business basis.

"Likewise it is intimated that since newspapers passes became scarce and hard to get at, the press of Ohio has cultivated a remarkable frankness in giving the bald facts as to railroad accidents and corporation fights with the courts unrounded. This is also a very uncomfortable and displeasing experience for the railroad officials and produces muchobjurgation concerning 'that infernal law.'

"It would not be surprising, says the Pittsburg Dispatch, if the Ohio railroads should discover, as the Pennsylvania roads have, that the law permits a certain degree of liberty in the issue of passes. But until they do so, the general public will be likely to grin and bear these novel effects of the railroad construction of the law, with undisturbed equanimity."
