Fancy Cattle Prices.

The highest prices ever paid for a Hereford was given by Adams Earl, of Sheffield Farm, La Fayette county, Indiana, for the bull Grove the price being \$7,000. Death of a Prominent Pythian.

St. LOUIS, July 15.-Robert F. Cowan, Supreme Keeper of Records and Seals of the Knights of Pythias died here today. He was born in Stanton, Va., in 1830. He represented Virginia in the Secession Convention and sat in the Confederate Congress. He was elected Judge of the Equity Court in Kansas City. He was a Royal Arch Mason and Old Fellow of high standing. He leaves a wife and three children.
