TAPPING TAHOE.

Senator Boyle Still Pushing His Big Irrigation Scheme.

The scheme of tapping Lake Tahoe and utilizing the splendid water power for irrigation and manufactures, has not yet been abandoned. The failure of the Legislature to grant a franchise will not effect the scheme, as San Francisco capital is determined to push the project. Senator Boyle says:

"A franchise from the Legislature would have been a great assistance, as it would have materially aided in floating the bonds in Europe. Any official backing that such a project has helps it in the East and Europe.

"The matter is still being canvassed in San Francisco by wealthy men who firmly believe in the project. By the time that the next Legislature meets another request for a franchise will be made, and by that time things will be in such a shape that no sane man will refuse his vote for a measure that will add millions to the taxable property of Nevada.

Salt Lake City to be Sued.

John Tobin, the Kansas City man who has been lecturing against Mormonism, resides at 400 East Twelfth Street, is about to institute suit against Salt Lake City for property valued at \$1,000,000. Tobin's claim is based on the following facts: In 1868 he was obliged to fly with the penalty of death hanging over him should he return. Just before John D. Lee was executed for the Mountain Meadows massacre, he confessed that he had been employed by Brigham Young to murder Tobin. He had, in fact, attacked his party and killed several, but only succeeded in wounding Tobin. At that time Tobin was obliged to fly from Salt Lake City. He then owned considerable property in the city. That property has since increased its value until it is now estimated at being worth over \$1,000,000. Mr. Tobin will immediately commence legal proceedings for the recovery of the property. Besides several eminent lawyers in that city, Roscoe Conkling has been engaged. The papers will probably be filed in a few days.

A Sensational Suit.

SALT LAKE, July 1st.—Suit has been brought in the Territorial Supreme Court to escheat the Mormon Church property to the United States fund of the Territory, as provided in the Edmunds-Tucker bill of last Winter. The value set on the property is \$2,000,000 real estate, and \$1,000,000 personal property. Under the United States laws no church in any Territory is allowed to hold more than \$50,000 worth of property. The appointment of a Receiver is asked for, to whom all persons having any property of the Church be directed to turn over the same. The hearing of the case is set for September 15th next.

A Crow-Bait's Value.
