SHERMAN'S CANDIDATURE.

The Senator Anxious for Nomination - His Admiration for Blaine.

New York, August 2.-A special to the times says: Recently the Express, of this city, printed some reminiscence of Hon. A. N. Cole, who claims to have been the father of the Republican party, and who for thirty years has been on more or less intimate terms with the great political leaders. In these articles there has been much concerning these leaders, and it appears that the papers containing the articles were forwarded to Mr. Sherman. The latter found time to write the following decidedly pointed letter: Mr. Cole: I have read with deep interest what is said in the Express of July 10th in reference to Blaine's opinion of myself. It is quite true, as Mr. Blaine says, that he and I have always been on intimate terms and have always had the highest regard for each other. We were both presented as candidates in 1880, but then scores of Mr. Blaine's friends in Ohio made the fatal mistake of dividing the Ohio delegation and refused to vote for me, but voted for Mr. Blaine. This not only defeated me, but prevented a concentration of the Ohio delegation in favor of Mr. Blaine. On the night before the last day of the Convention, he said he hoped the Ohio delegation would unite upon me, and, if so my nomination would follow, as a matter of course, but so much feeling had been caused by the division that it was found impossible, and was reconciled by the nomination of General Garfield. It may be that the same division will produce a like result in the approaching canvass. I certainly have no objection to the nomination of Blaine, and if he is nominated I will do what I did in 1884-do all I can to secure his election. He is more injured than benefited by the activity of his friends, in making divisions in Republican States. By some it is considered that the special significance of this letter is the fact that it indicates no change whatever in the fair rivalry and candid relationship which has long existed between Sherman and Blaine. It is held to mean that John Sherman will get the Republican nomination for President, if he can, and if he cannot will be glad to see it fall to James G. Blaine, and that should the honor fall upon Sherman it may be taken for granted that the statesman will have the hearty support of Blaine of Maine.

The McDonald Divorce. The San Francisco papers continue to make a good deal out of the McDonald divorce case. McDonald claims that his wife is crazy. A gentleman who is interviewed by Monday's Examiner, says: "It is only a few days ago since I saw her and I can assure you that any one who would take her to be at all cranky or the victim of hallucinations would in time find that it was himself who was laboring under a delusion. "She is a very bright, intelligent young woman. Her sister is a teacher in Mill's Seminary. They come from Carson City, Nevada, where her parents reside. So far as I know, the family is a very respectable one, and highly esteemed by those acquainted with its several members. "You may remember Dr. McDonald's defeat when running as a candidate for Governor. Since that time luck has been against him, Subsequently St. John beat him in the nomination for President of the United States on the Prohibition ticket. His Vinegar Bitters were the cause of his defeat, and the disclosures there made proved disastrous to his traffic in that article. All his efforts at resuscitating it have proved unavailing. Again, he lost heavily in an Eastern bank in which he was interested."

BORN TO WIN.

Ben Ellsworth's Ranch Venture.

Out on the warm springs' road is a little acre of ground cultivated by Ben Ellsworth. A couple of years ago he fenced it in and plowed it up, and every time anybody passed it, it was the thing to crack jokes at Ellsworth's expense. The land was so poor that weeds wouldn't grow on it, yet he planted a crop of wheat. It was very stunted and worthless and he plowed it under. Then he covered it with plenty of manure and planted another crop. This was also a failure, but he manured the land, sunk two artesian wells and planted again. The tide began to turn, Ellsworth had won his fight and now the land is producing as fine a garden as one could wish. Everything is growing to prodigious size and those who buy their vegetables of Sacramento Chinamen begin to wish they had a garden patch like Ellsworth's. The land was considered worthless, but as the APPEAL has always held, there is no such thing as worthless land in this State. All it needs is muscle manure and water.

RANCHING AT SUTRO.

The Water in the Tunnel Giving Out. The Sutro Tunnel Company have now 16,000 acres of excellent land under cultivation which has all along been irrigated by the immense stream of hot water running out of the Sutro tunnel. Since the discovery of large ore bodies on the upper levels, the lower levels have been practically abandoned and very little water is being pumped up to the tunnel level. Since the earthquake cold water poured into the tunnel from numbers of crevices formed by the shock and the water now running out of the tunnel is cold, and not much of it. When the new water power from Marlette Lake is used to run machinery etc., on the Comstock, a good deal of the waste will go into the tunnel and there will be plenty of water for irrigation in Sutro.

ARTESIAN WATER.

How it Makes Plants Grow. Some months ago Mr. Cagwin sunk an artesian well on his place, and writes to the APPEAL that he has a never-failing well of pure water running several feet above ground, and he has raised some vegetables that beat the world. One pie plant leaf is 2 feet 4 inches in diameter; beets that weigh 15 lbs each; a sunflower stalk 10 feet high, and everything in proportion. His garden yields so much that he can hardly step about in it. All this comes from a combination of sagebrush soil and artesian water.

Society News From Austin.

Some weeks ago a girl out in Austin made a dress entirely of thread, using up 11,849 spools of thread in completing the dress.
