Stewart's Irrigation Bill.
 In a private letter received at this office from Senator Stewart occurs the following:
 Whoever telegraphed that I was going to prepare an irrigation bill especially for California neglected to speak to me on the subject before sending the telegram. How he could have learned the fact before I did seems a little odd. I can only account for it on the theory that times are a little peculiar. I have introduced a bill on the subject covering all the States and Territories on the Pacific Coast for the purpose of calling attention to the necessity of a new method of surveys, whereby the arable land will be separated from the grazing land and such reservations made for the rights of way for ditches and canals as will make irrigation possible. I have conversed with several members of the Committee on Public Lands on the subject and they all seemed deeply interested, and I think the prospects very good for obtaining legislation during the present session.

The Bicycle Fiend.

The bicycle rider occasionally turns his wheel to the detriment of his neighbors. The Creole.

The audience which assembled at the Carson Theatre last evening were treated to a genuine dramatic festival. A better performance has never been seen here. Miss Granger is a beautiful woman, but her physical charms are merely an adjunct to her genius and wonderful ability in portraying the intense passion of human nature. The chief charm of her acting is the naturalness with which she invests the character she assumes.
 The transition from the earlier scenes of the play, which show the light, frivolous nature of "Cora," to the revengeful woman in the second act, whose reason finally gives way before the hopeless love she bears. "George Duhamel" was managed with the rarest skill, and held the audience to the close. The performance of Miss Granger shows the most painstaking study of the part and a full appreciation of its best points. Her support was excellent. Mr. R. Germain, the leading man, is a very clever young actor of handsome face and figure. Old-time favorites were recognized in the persons of Mrs. F. M. Bates and George Caire. The rest of the support was first-class.
Cassidy on Fair.

The Genoa Inquest.

On Monday an inquest was held on the body of Mrs. Maxwell, of Genoa, whose death was looked upon by many people as having been due to savage treatment of her son, John Maxwell. There was medical testimony to show that there were bruises on her body, arm and neck. Those on the body were on the abdomen and looked as if she had been kicked. The marks on the neck showed choking.
 There was also nearly \$1,000 missing which she had a few days before her death. It was shown that on Friday the day before her death she had quarrelled with her son's wife and that her son grasped his mother and pushed her back into her room using some force. The missing money was satisfactorily accounted for as it had been left in the hands of her sister a few days before. No other evidence could be produced. The son denied all knowledge of the bruises and the jury exonerated him.
