NEVADA LAND.

The Business in Sagebrush Land During 1887.

We are indebted to the courtesy of the Surveyor General for the following Memoranda of business done in the State Land Office during the year 1887.

There were 1306 applications to purchased State Lands filed. Covering.....428,783.03 Acres.

Ninety-two contracts were issued in duplicate covering 16,401.68 acres at \$1 25 per acre.

Twenty-eight contracts covering 3,267.08 acres at \$2 50 per acre, representing—\$22,935.84 drawing interest.

State Land Patents were issued covering 24,006.67 acres.

Official Township Plats have been made of which 364 Plats together with official abstract of all State Land entries have been forwarded to the county assessor of the several counties, as required by law.

In addition to this 238 small Township Plats and abstracts have been furnished.

It will be seen by the foregoing that the labors of the State Land Office have been largely increased by the requirement of the last Legislature and the order of the Land Department at Washington, asking for "Non-Mineral Affidavits" on all selections of lands by the State awaiting approval. Non-Mineral affidavits covering about 880,000 acres, the greater number of which were prepared in this office have been forwarded as required by the Hon. Commissioner.

The State has received two approved lists of lands:

No. 6.—Carson City Land District, 41,037.05.

No. 6.—Eureka Land District 39,339.99 acres, on which contracts will be issued at the expiration of the legal time.

GLANDERS IN LYON COUNTY.

Danger of its Breaking Out Here.

Glanders have broken out in Lyon county near Dayton during the past few weeks, and over 20 horses have been taken with it. The disease was brought over here from California by a man who sold some infected stage horses to a rancher near Dayton. He sold in turn to James Austin, who also sold to T. B. Smith. The result is that 13 horses have been shot and more will have to go. Dr. Trullinger went before the Board of County Commissioners in Lyon, asking that action be taken, but the District Attorney held that they had no power. There is a law, however, governing such cases. Some of Smith's infected horses have been fed recently in one of the hay yards of this city. The Commissioners of this county should take immediate action or there will be a run of glanders in this county.

Yesterday J. Nichol, the thoroughbred horseman of Mason Valley, came before the Board of Commissioners and stated that the disease was on at least ten ranches of Mason Valley, and it would become necessary for all counties adjoining to take immediate steps. The Board said it was ready to cooperate with any other county that would take the initial steps. It was proposed to appoint Dr. Trullinger as a veterinary surgeon to go through the State and pick out the infected horses and superintend their killing. The Board held that under the law it was necessary to have some competent man in authority to diagnose the disease.
