

A LITTLE OFF.

The S. F. Chronicle, in an editorial on the alleged shortage in the appropriation fund of the Public Building here, dilates on the waste and extravagance of the Government method of building, and closes with:

"Carson City will probably form no exception to this silly and wasteful rule, more especially if there are to be any more such drains on the appropriation as \$20,000 a year for salaries. If this statement be correct, and the salaried officials patronized home industries, it is fair to presume that Carson has been a fairly lively place since the appropriation became available."

There is nothing in the above. The two men who have been employed as Superintendent of Construction and clerk, have been most of the time on half pay, and after they paid their grub bills there wasn't much left.

The APPEAL has advertised the proposals for bids, etc., from time to time, but could never manage to get a cent from the economical Government, although the bills were forwarded long ago.

However, we don't mind that. If the Democratic Administration are unable to pay, the APPEAL will run the advertising gratis, if they will only put the building up.

A K. of P. Grand Lodge Suspended.

Howard Douglass, Supreme Chancellor of the World of Knights of Pythias, has suspended the entire jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the State of Pennsylvania for disobedience of orders. The disobedience consists in refusing to amend the constitution in certain particulars as has been previously required. Chancellor Douglass will cite the officers of the Grand Lodge to appear before him January 21st to show why the charter should not be canceled.

Carson's Public Building.

A press dispatch from Washington relative to the new public building at Carson gives the impression that \$20,000 had already been squandered, with nothing beyond salary expenditures to show for the money. Superintendent Ryland says that the dispatch is untrue in nearly every particular, and that as a matter of fact the whole expenditures for material, salaries, labor, and disbursing agents commission will not exceed \$5,000.

The Philadelphia Press offers the following "nut" for the Free Traders to crack—let them make the most of it: "The Singer Sewing Machine Company has one factory in New Jersey and one in Scotland, both of which produce machines involving the same process and the same workmanship. The factory in Scotland employs a third more workmen than the one in New Jersey, but the weekly pay roll of the factory in New Jersey is more than twice as much as the pay roll of the one in Scotland. We give the tariff tinker leave to go among his constituents and use these facts to show them how American workmen are being ground down by the horrid tariff."

The Irish World: "There are two kinds of free trade. One, which would do away with all customs and duties, and which is charming in theory, is entirely illusory; the other would retain the custom house and levy duties for the support of government only, but nothing for protection. This is British free trade. And this latter is the kind of free trade that Cleveland favors in his message. Well, this is the issue. All honest men will be glad that it is made. If the Republicans will give their loins and manfully go into the fight, with 'Protection' as their watchword, in our judgment victory is assured for them. If they fail to seize the opportunity offered, they will be beaten and what is more, they will deserve to be beaten."
